Long before Hillary Clinton ever walked on a stage to give a speech, there was Ruth Kahn Stovroff (z"l). Ruth, who passed away this October at the age of 104, was the original "Wonder Woman." She was the first woman president of both the Buffalo Jewish Federation and the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies; she was smart, well-educated, funny, gracious and gifted with a personality that enabled her to have other people want to listen to her, want and follow her, and want to be associated in whatever project she was leading. She was a role model to every single Jewish and non-Jewish woman I know who was engaged in civic life in the second half of the twentieth century as well as the nearly two decades of the twenty first. My term as President of Buffalo Jewish Federation is drawing to a close at the end of this calendar year. At our Annual Meeting held on November 3, 2016 at the University at Buffalo Center for the Arts, I gave my second and last annual report. For those of you who were not able to be with us that evening, I am pleased to share my report with you.

Let me start out by congratulating Sheri Rodman and Jonathan Epstein on their well-deserved recognition as the Dr. Milton and Ruth Kahn and Dr. Meyer and Ann Riwchun Young Leadership Award recipients. Sheri, I look forward to the week after next, when you and I will be among nearly three dozen of us forming the largest ever Jewish Buffalo delegation at the Jewish Federations of North America General Assembly in Washington DC.

At the same time, Jonathan, you, along with other leaders of Kadimah Academy, will be attending the Partnership for Excellence in Jewish Education's Governance and Fundraising Academy in North Carolina. Kadimah's participation in this terrific program, which is being underwritten in part through Buffalo Jewish Federation's Human Capital Fund, is bound to have significant impacts on the quality and success of Kadimah's leadership.

Buffalo Jewish Federation is obsessed with investing in our next generation of leadership. We're proud to see the likes of Sheri and Jonathan at the center of the continuous pipeline of talent that we are nourishing to build a vibrant and caring Jewish Buffalo.

My second and last year as your President has been one of progress and promise. We've made strides in leadership development, engaging previously uninvolved members of our community, deepening our relationship with Israel, and developing resources to power the programs, activities and human interactions that enable the community we envision.

Leadership Development - One of the

highlights of this year was the visit in March by Alan Morinis, head of The Mussar Institute, as Scholar in Residence. Mussar is a program of learning Jewish value traits by study and practice. During Alan's short time with us, nearly 150 people were exposed to the beauty of Mussar learning. Alan also kicked off our Lead with Jewish Values program, during which 20 leaders representing ten different agencies or synagogues studied and put into practice midot - or traits - such as Humility, Patience, Generosity, Honor, Gratitude and Loving Kindness. One of our newly elected board members, Cheryl Stein, was my classmate. Cheryl, I look forward to serving with you in the coming years as we help each other implement the important teachings we practiced. There is planning afoot to expand the scope of Mussar offerings in Jewish Buffalo, so stay tuned. I'd like to acknowledge George Gellman, whose generosity and vision is instrumental in bringing Mussar in Buffalo to fruition.

Engagement - As you all know, Rob Goldberg is well into his second year as CEO of Buffalo Jewish Federation. Rob's impact is out of all proportion to the short time he has been leading us. You heard our wonderful young Annual Meeting Chairs, Ivana Slifstein and Logan Woodard, refer to the many task forces and initiatives that have been started under Rob's leadership, and the numbers of people previously uninvolved in Federation or even Jewishly who have stepped up with enthusiasm and energy to power these projects. From our Leadership Think Tank, to our new and exciting Buffalo Jewish Service Corps, from our Branding Task Force which developed our new name - Buffalo Jewish Federation, and our new moniker, JewishBuffalo - to our Jewish Campus Life and Hillel Oversight Task Forces which combined community and campus talent to reimagine how Hillel can have a greater impact on college life in

Buffalo, we are moving forward.

Most recently, when my predecessor, Immediate Past President David Desmon, convened our nominating committee, David, along with Rob and Steve Weiss, our incoming President, urged us to invite several folks previously uninvolved in Federation to sit on the Nominating Committee. They nominated a slate of candidates for elected governor which includes several young, dynamic and energetic women who will diversify our board and, more importantly, bring new ideas to the forefront of our community. Thanks to all of you for voting in these capable folks. With them on board, our future is bright.

We've got even longer range engagement programs in the works, including The Jewish Cultural Festival in March 2018 that Hailey Epstein told us about this evening, and the JFNA General Assembly in Jerusalem in November 2018. With almost three dozen of us attending the GA in Washington DC this year, imagine Jewish Buffalo ascending to Jerusalem in 2018 in even greater numbers!! Mark your calendars.

Enhancing our connection to Israel -As Logan and Ivana mentioned, Buffalo has embarked on a collaboration with 13 like sized US communities, Budapest, Hungary and the Western Galilee Region of Israel, or as I've dubbed it, sister cities on steroids. The opportunities for us in Buffalo to connect with our brothers and sisters in the Western Galilee, in Budapest, and to share their connections with other US communities, are boundless. Whether you travel to Israel on an organized trip, as our two major reform congregations, TBZ and Shir Shalom, are doing with their local Presbyterian partner congregations next year, or on your own, we will be able to make connections for you in the Western Galilee no matter your interests. There are opportunities in medicine, the arts, education, development and any number of fields, as well as some of the most spectacular scenery and sites of historical interest.

Resource Development – I'd like to focus this last section of my substantive remarks on the campus, because we're featuring Jewish life on campus at this Annual Meeting, and our keynote speaker is Eric Fingerhut. As Hillel International President, Eric has his finger on the pulse of Jewish Campus life. Hillel of Buffalo particularly, and Jewish campus life in Buffalo generally, have had dedicated and hard working professionals and student interns who have, with significantly

limited resources, done a great job welcoming and engaging young Jews on campus. Too many, however, remain unconnected, in large part because despite good strategies and dedicated implementers, we've not had the resources necessary to power a staff of sufficient size and muscle to make the necessary inroads. Now, however, we can change all that. I am delighted to announce that four sets of donors, Marilyn Shuman, Gordon and Gretchen Gross, and Sol Messinger, along with the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies, have made substantial multi-year commitments to Hillel of Buffalo which, in partnership with Hillel International, will give Buffalo the opportunity to develop campus programs that will not only be the envy of its counterparts, but will establish the model for other campuses like ours to develop their own programs. Thank you, Marilyn, Gordon and Gretchen, Sol, and Peter Fleischmann of Jewish Philanthropies, for your generosity and vision.

Before I relinquish the podium, please allow me a few moments of reflection. It has been an honor to serve as your Buffalo Jewish Federation President the past two years. There are several folks to thank for making my experience the most satisfying and energizing volunteer posting I have ever had.

Rob Goldberg, in you we have a goldmine. Seeing your work up close is, in a word, inspiring. Your vision is matched only by your energy. Thank you for all you've brought and continue to bring to Jewish Buffalo. Thanks especially for being the greatest professional partner a volunteer could ask for. Thanks mostly, however, for being a friend.

Rob's work and his success do not happen in a vacuum. We have wonderful professional and support staff at Federation. Ellen Goldstein, editor of our acclaimed Jewish Journal, Randi Morkisz who runs our terrific campaign, Debbie Pivarsi whose financial management is top notch, Miriam Abramovich and Mandy Weiss whose engagement efforts with Nickel City Jews and PJ Library are so impactful. That's just a small part of what these dedicated people do. Supported by Joan Kwiatkowski, Mary Jo Fragale, Lori Lewkowicz and Nadine Ryback, this is a team whose quality and quantity of product is unmatched. I've had the privilege to get to know and work with each of you, and it has been my honor to do so.

Remembering Ruth Kahn Stovroff: A Woman of Valor

Ruth Kahn Stovroff, the first woman president of the Buffalo Jewish Federation, recently passed away at age 104 in Buffalo, New York. She was indeed a Woman of Valor in every sense of the word. She was a heroine, a role model, a wife, mother, friend, community leader and benefactor. She was the person we all wanted to emulate.

A native of Denver, Ruth Kahn Stovroff, dovenne of the Buffalo Jewish Community, arrived in Buffalo in 1937 and built bridges to other communities and building legacies for the Jewish community ever since. From the 1940's when she joined the JCC's Camp Lakeland committee, to her assisting in reshaping the community's health and human service system, to her becoming the first woman president of the Jewish Federation of Greater Buffalo, then the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies, she set the pace that every single young Jewish woman in a Buffalo leadership role was keen to emulate.

The Dr. Milton and Ruth H. Kahn Young Women's Leadership Award was established by Ruth and her first late husband in order to recognize young women in leadership roles at Buffalo's Jewish Federation, with 40+ young women earning the award since its inception.

Mrs. Stovroff's influence extended into the greater Western New York community and beyond. The Food Bank of Western New York was founded in Mrs. Stovroff's living room many years ago, and she continued to inspire such organizations as the Elizabeth Pierce Olmsted Center for the Visually Impaired—which honored her this Fall-- Child and Family Services of Western New York, the National Conference for Community and Justice, and the national Florence Heller Research Institute of the Jewish Community Centers Assn. She was a founding member of the Western New York Woman's Fund, and the first president of the local Community Action Organization. Mrs. Stovroff she was inducted into the Western New York Women's Hall of Fame in 2005.

In 2012, the Jewish Federations of North America's national Lion of Judah Magazine profiled Ruth as she turned 100 years old in an issue which highlight exceptional women of all ages. This is part of what the story noted:

"As she reaches her century mark, Ruth Kahn Stovroff represents the absolute best of the Buffalo Jewish Community.

She is incomparable, as her dear friend Gerda Weissman Klein would tell you. She has created solutions to community problems, found ways to encourage young people to achieve and helped to create community that will last well beyond her. She is indeed a Woman of Valor."

May her beautiful memory forever be a blessing to all of us.

Reflections on Ruth by:

At the Buffalo Jewish Federation Annual Meeting November 3rd, Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies Director Peter Fleischmann paid tribute to Ruth observing that "We have lost one of the most respected and revered figures in the history of our community. Ruth Kahn Stovroff was an extraordinary leader who possessed a quiet dignity and strength that drew people to her. She has had an enormous impact not just in the Jewish community but throughout our city and region as well. She leaves a profound legacy that will endure for generations to come."

"For nearly 70 years Ruth has been a vital, important part of my life. When I arrived in Buffalo as a young bride in 1946, Ruth was already deeply involved in community affairs. She was a role model to many young women like me who were seeking an opportunity to be involved in an important civic cause. I was drawn to her in hopes of learning how best to be engaged and make a meaningful contribution. At first she was, to me, a distant, admirable figure who I wanted to emulate. To my joy, she reached out to me almost immediately and enveloped me in that warm, healing grace which she exuded. Our friendship became akin to a family relationship. Since neither of us had sisters and she was12 years my senior, it was natural for me to look up to her for guidance and advice; which was always sound.

My children called her "Aunt Ruth", but she really was more than an aunt to them. She also played Cupid for my daughter Vivian and Jim Ullman, the son of Ruth's dear friend Sonya Ullman. Thus, Ruth became almost a grandmother to their children. And her matchmaking skills extended to many, many other successful marriages.

Over the years our age difference no longer mattered as we shared thoughts as equals. But to me she was always cloaked in a certain nobility, even a majesty, that one could touch. I never saw Ruth really angry; just perhaps on rare occasions upset and thoughtful. Living in different cities for the last many years, and given the realities of our advancing age, we were compelled to rely on phone calls to replace the in-person get-togethers which

I cherished. For the past few years I would call Ruth nearly every morning. Over time, the conversations became shorter and shorter. Up until two weeks ago it was:

"How are you Ruth?"

"Fine, dear, and how are you?"
"Fine. I love you and miss you."

"I love you and miss you, too."
"We will talk tomorrow."

Only now I will not talk to her tomorrow. There is a void in my heart for the days that remain for me."

"Ruth was the wind beneath my wings. She was an inspiration to not only me, but also so many women tahroughout the community. Her wisdom, warmth and love made a difference to others throughout her life, and her legacy of compassion will continue on long after her death. 25 years ago, Ruth came to me to ask me to lead MCCI- now NFIC. It was because of her that I was ab le to make the transition into the position I hold today. I will always be thankful and grateful to her. "

"Ruth was the epitome of great leadership. She had a special way of getting people involved in her projects, whether it was the Food Bank, Federation, the CAO or the Olmsted Center. For the entire 68 years of our friendship, I was aware that our connection was a special thing. Among other things, we were part of a group of women friends and we called ourselves the "God Squad," because we often attended Saturday morning Shabbat services and Classical Reform services together at Temple Beth Zion. Right before she died, Ruth voted for Hillary Clinton for president by absentee ballot."




what's in store for us. I'll be there to help in any way I can.

Our children have been researching our Ukranian ancestry for some time and have uncovered our father's and paternal grandfather's family's life before and after they emigrated from the Ukraine. Our father came to the U.S. in 1904, and others of his fourteen siblings went to other countries.

Our uncle Abraham Avrunin emigrated to Israel where he helped establish one of the first kibbutzim. Later, his wife became a member of the Knesset. Abraham also became famous as a scholar, poet, composer, educator and author(we have a book he edited which still needs translation, if anyone in the community is capable/interested). We are unendingly proud of our family's many and notable contributions to the life and well-being of Israel and wanted to say so to the broader Buffalo community. And as Chanukah approaches, when you sing songs, remember that we wanted to give credit where credit is due.

Shir Shalom & Gesher Schools Working Together

With just over 30 students, Temple Beth Tzedek's religious school was struggling to stay afloat. At the same time, Congregation Shir Shalom's enrollment was down to about 80 students-far below its enrollment figures from years ago-and the school needed a boost. Thus began an unusual and challenging educational collaboration between Beth Tzedek, a conservative congregation, and Shir Shalom, a Reform and Reconstructionist temple with much more liberal traditions and practices. Creative strategies, both large and small, were found to bridge that gap since the partnership began this school year.

Students attend Judaic studies classes together, but split up by temple for Hebrew languages classes, since Beth Tzedek starts Hebrew instruction at an earlier age and gives it greater emphasis. In addition, school days-held at Shir Shalom on Tuesdays and Sundays—are about 20 minutes longer for Beth Tzedek students so they have time for prayer sessions led by their clergy-Rabbi Perry Netter or Cantor Mark Spindler.

Dilemmas pop up on occasion, but are resolved equitably and cooperatively because the congregations have developed a strong sense of respect, trust and understanding, said Einav Symons, the

Beth Tzedek religious school leader. "It's really about building community," Mrs. Symons said. "Once you know what matters to the other temple, you can be respectful and responsive to them."

The collaboration was originally expected to begin in the 2017-08 school year, when Beth Tzedek is scheduled to construct a new facility and space could be an issue. But, when planning proceeded more quickly than expected, the temples decided to start a year earlier. In broader terms, Shir Shalom Rabbi Alex Lazarus-Klein views the collaboration as the type of measure needed to keep Buffalo's dwindling Jewish community vibrant and strong. "Nothing could be more exciting than the collaboration between our Shir Shalom and Beth Tzedek religious schools," Rabbi Lazarus-Klein said. "It means more kids, a more complete staff and a better overall educational experience for both sides. That doesn't mean it's easy. There are a lot of things we have to struggle through-different expectations from both sets of parents, time constraints and, of course, differing denominational ideology. But it is so worth it. This is one of the most exciting things that has happened since I arrived in Buffalo."

Hope Bongiomo, Shir Shalom's director of education, said the collaboration is giving students a broader, more expansive view of Iudaism. "It just feels like a natural connection," she said, "It feels like one school to me."

Update on Plans for Weinberg's Future

The Weinberg Campus board and executive team are continuing to talk with possible purchasers and are collecting the information we need to properly evaluate each opportunity. As I have mentioned before in The Jewish *Iournal*, it is important that we make the right decision for the community and the residents we serve by ensuring that our facilities remain in the hands of a high quality provider. The process is on track, but will take time. We are moving as diligently as possible. Any decision to sell will require approvals from the New York State Health Department and the New York State Attorney General. In all that typically takes 12 to 18 months. We will continue to keep you informed of any updates.

Meanwhile, the team at Weinberg is concentrating on making significant internal improvements. Many of you may have noted that the Rosa Coplon Living Center (nursing home) jumped up to a 3-star rating from Medicare, and within that received high ratings for overall quality of care. Assisted living residences and other adult care facilities are also licensed and inspected every 12 to 18 months by the New York State Department of Health to ensure compliance with mandated rules and regulations. Dosberg Manor did very well on its full inspection completed in September-a testament to the dedication of our team.

We are starting to look forward to the next stage of our organizational life. The Board of Weinberg Campus will have significant decisions to make regarding our future mission. While we know that we will be working within the realm of services to older adults and our most frail, there are many possible roads that we can head down. Toward that end, we invited volunteer and professional leaders of Buffalo-area Jewish communal agencies that serve older adults, and the frail elderly in particular, to a meeting with our board in November as an opportunity to dialogue on potential futures and to provide input to our board for its ongoing deliberations.



Sharing Shabbat with New Americans

Nickel City Jews joined forces with **Jewish Family** Service for the second event in their dinner series. which focuses on building community, particularly among Jews and new Americans. On a Friday night in October, a group of people refugees, immigrants, Jews, and non-Jewish Americansgathered at my home with the intention of sharing a meal and forging new connections.

The evening started with the group sheltered from the rain in a homemade sukkah, where the Jewish attendees shared Shabbat and Sukkot prayers with the rest of the group. We passed around a lulay and etrog for everyone to experience as we shared background on the holidays we were celebrating. Moving indoors, the twentysome guests filled their plates with brisket and potato kugel and squeezed into the living room. Conversations between folks who were strangers just an hour earlier flowed naturally.

Some of the refugee and immigrant guests agreed to share their experience with immigration, and the evening began to alternate between group conversations and smaller ones on the side. It was a wonderful opportunity for expression and education.

One guest explained that he didn't like the label "refugee" because of how others think of refugees: as uneducated, unwanted individuals. In reality, refugee is only a temporary status given to someone when they have no choice but to leave their homes in order to protect their families, and they are granted that status by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees.

Many of those resettled here

are highly educated and left behind careers as doctors or lawyers. Anna Niyonzima, who is serving as an AmeriCorps volunteer at Jewish Family Service and first came to the United States as a refugee many years ago said. "'Refugee' is not who I am. It was a status that was given to me."

It is important for Buffalo natives to hear the stories and perspectives of these individuals who are enriching our city. Another recent immigrant guest pointed out that not all refugees are perfect either. They are just like any other group of people, each with varying strengths and weaknesses, which is why they should be treated the same as anybody else. It is our duty as Jews to welcome those who have been pushed from their homes as our ancestors once were.

makes 15 plus donut holes!

For the Dough:

3/4 c warm milk

1 package active dry yeast

1 Tbsp. butter, melted

1/3 c sugar

1 egg

2 1/2 c flour pinch of nutmeg pinch of cinnamon

1/2 tsp. salt

For the Glaze:

1/4 c milk

1 tsp. vanilla

2 c confectioners sugar

To make dough:

- 1. In bowl of mixer, place 1/4 c milk and yeast. Let stand 5 minutes. Add remaining milk, sugar and butter. Stir to combine. Add the egg, flour and spices. Mix to combine. Knead in bowl until the dough becomes smooth...add a little more flour if necessary.
- 2. Turn onto a floured board and knead 5 minutes. Place in oiled bowl, cover and let rise in warm place for
- 3. Roll out dough on floured board to 1/2" thick. Cut out the donuts with a 3" cutter and the hole with a 1" cutter...place these on a greased baking sheet 2" apart and cover lightly with a clean towel...let rise for 45
- 4. Pre-heat oven to 375. Bake donuts for 7 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool.
- 5. Mix together the glaze and dip the cool donuts....enjoy. Serve with a jelly chaser if you feel the need for a true Jelly Donut!



Rabbi Joshua Strosberg: Two Thousand Years of Gefilte Fish

A bizarre, humorous and authentically Jewish moment occurred at the Ahava Raba klezmer concert when Chazzan Yanky Lemmer introduced one of the songs. To paraphrase him: a Yid is sitting down to shaloshudes, the third Shabbos meal, the holiest time of the week. He clings to the last precious moments of Shabbos before he must reenter the work week. He slowly sings a melody full of brokenness and longing for the bitter exile to end. He reaches for another piece of gefilte fish...Two thousand years is too long." Then laughter from the audience. It took me a second to figure out what was funny about this, but then I understood. Two thousand of what is too long? Exile...or gefilte fish?

That was what I call a Rashi moment. A moment in which what seems like a simple sentence or idea is understood in a new way. Rashi, the 11th century Torah sage, was the master of uncovering fresh interpretations of old Biblical verses. For instance, in this week's parsha, a well known verse states about Abraham: "God took him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars..." The simple understanding is that God took Abraham outside of his tent for a glimpse of the night sky. But Rashi puts a twist on it: God took Abraham outside of his constricted consciousness that was bound by the idea that stars control our destiny. God showed him that he was outside of those stars and free to craft his own destiny.

Is that the original intent of the verse? Probably not, but no matter. Out of all the Rabbinic commentaries on Torah, it is only Rashi's that is mentioned by the Shulchan Aruch, the code of Jewish Law,

as an obligation upon every Jew to study along with the weekly Torah portion. Why? What's so special about Rashi's commentary? Because Rashi involves the reader in the process of discovery. We see new colors and designs emerging from an old text right before our eyes. And as Chazzan Lemmer's gefilte fish story shows, Jews love to discover new meanings.

Nachmanides wrote his own commentary to the Torah, often disagreeing with Rashi's interpretation and yet he writes this in his introduction: "I will place as an illumination before me the lights of the pure menorah, the commentaries of our Rabbi Shlomo (Rashi)..." As Hanukkah approaches and we light the Menorah, let us shine new light on old texts. Don't just read the Bible. Read it with Rashi. Don't settle for gefilte fish when there is sea bass and filet of sole out there. Two thousand years is too long...



Shir Shalom Going Green!

Driven by a moral imperative to save the planet, Congregation Shir Shalom is going green. A newly-formed committee plans to build awareness of the dangers of global warming by greatly increasing the synagogue's recycling efforts, using more efficient lighting and planting trees on the temple grounds.

"You start with the low-hanging fruit and proceed from there," said Joe Morris, chairman of the Green Committee. "We're in a very early stage." But intentions and enthusiasm run high. Ultimately, the committee hopes to slash energy



consumption by taking a close look at the efficiency of appliances, windows and doors, and to meet a major portion of the temple's power needs through the use of solar panels. "That would be the ultimate statement in green," said Morris, who is retired after 40 years as an aerospace engineer.

Shir Shalom Rabbi Alex Lazarus-Klein said the group not only has the potential to implement cost-savings, but vividly reflects the Jewish commitment to Tikkun Olam, or repairing the world. "We're living in a changing world, and it's very important that synagogues take the lead in

Tikkun Olam." Rabbi Lazarus-Klein said. "It's part of our role. Honestly, Shir Shalom hasn't been doing enough in regard to the environment." But he said the enthusiasm of Morris and the committee members has focused fresh attention and energy on the issue.

Morris said the group will look at a variety of

possibilities for funding its efforts, including grants, joint efforts with other religious institutions and contributions from congregants. He hopes to avoid asking the temple board to commit operating funds.

The committee's establishment had an unusual twist. Morris-who has degrees in both engineering and physics-gave a well-received speech to the Shir Shalom Men's Group about recent advances in physics, and was asked to come back and talk about global warming.

As he researched his second talk, Morris became more and more concerned about the potentially catastrophic impact of global warming and, he said, our mishandling of the world God entrusted to us.

Members of the committee include Brian Schepart, Daniel Kester, Barry Heitner, Ronna Glickman and Jan Berg. Other congregants are welcome to join.


A sunny day at PALS


As the weeks went on, the residents of Weinberg started bringing personal memorabilia to share with the teens. Students were engulfed with the history

Beth El Genealogical Records

Year by year, the fascination with genealogy grows and it seems like near and dear, neighbors and friends, are all in search of somebody! While these very personal explorations bring their practitioners personal joy and greater selfunderstanding, when an individual undertakes this for a group, or an organization, they elevate the personal pursuit to a community endeavor. This is why the Temple Beth El materials collected, collated and transformed by Muriel Selling are so important, not just for synagogue members but for the history of Jewish Buffalo more broadly too. Muriel Selling created a number of resources in her roles within the synagogue - as de-facto Temple historian - and as part of the leadership of the cemetery organization. One of her main listings combined historical materials and membership rosters to provide detailed membership lists that include not just individual names, and when members joined, but spouses' date of birth and date of death as well as marriage dates. In addition, where she was able, she included Hebrew names, place of work, company name, business name, college or university, profession, and Levy or Cohen status. This dot matrix continuous feed document does not photograph well, but it is a treasury of information, and its modest appearance belies its critical contents.

Likewise, the cemetery lists created and compiled by Muriel Selling include expected information such as grave number, name and date of death, but also includes records of rights such as reserved space status, and whether a deceased came from overseas, for example - if they had died during military service. It also includes family relationships; information; headstone details. location: cemetery topography, natural features ("tree nearby") and even pew holder status for the much older entries

These 3-inchthick series of loose oversize pages also help anyone seeking further information for those buried up to the 1990s at Pine Ridge. Another resource was a series of volumes that provides a wide range of member materials that relate to the Beth El "Family History Project" which was captured as part of the Temple Beth El 150th Anniversary Committee in 1997. In two volumes, Muriel Selling enabled family members to supply

genealogical information, letters and photographs, and for this we have not just the genealogist avocation at play, but members stylizing their own family histories. Muriel Selling, a retired general contractor, was involved in a range of organizations in lay leadership positions, not just Beth El. Not only did she assemble these helpful materials, she also co-founded Jewish Genealogy Society of Buffalo, and was a cemetery administrator for the independent fraternal Holy Order of the Living.

Jewish Family Service Returns To Roots For 2017

The well-being of the Buffalo Jewish community has been at the heart of the mission of Jewish Family Service of Buffalo & Erie County (JFS) for more than 150 years. "We were founded to provide support to our own individuals, families, children and elders as they made the transition to life in America. Thanks to the support of this same community from one generation to the next, we are now able to extend the same kind of support to the broader community of which we are a critical part," JFS President and CEO Marlene Schillinger says.

For the last few years, the agency has focused on developing its resettlement services for today's immigrants and refugees—in keeping with the core commandments of tikkun olam (acts of kindness to perfect or repair the world) and tzedakah (giving aid, assistance and money to the poor and need . showing empathy and compassion).

"In 2014 we founded the Western New York Center for Survivors of Torture, a comprehensive and collaborative initiative that provides much needed support to Holocaust Survivors and their families as well as for the many individuals and families who have now resettled here from war-torn regions around the world," says Schillinger.

"This year we expanded our American Sign Language Class for Deaf refugees, and were honored last September when the Jewish Federation arranged for Oscarwinner Marlee Matlin, who was in Buffalo to help launch a Federation fund-raising initiative, visit one of our classes."

In 2017, Jewish Family Service will return to its roots, re-focusing services tailored for the Jewish community regarding mental and behavioral health care, well aging support, care coordination for elders and people with disabilities, and career development. The agency began in 1862 when the Hebrew Benevolent Union, Sisterhood of Zion, Women's Jewish Benevolent Society and Ladies Sewing Aid Society formed the Federation of Jewish Charities. The Federation formed the Iewish Welfare Society in 1930, which in 1947 became the Jewish Community Service Society with three departments: Family Service, Child Care and Vocational

In 1958, shortly after associating the agency with the United Way, former executive director Albert Deemer established its first psychiatric outpatient clinic: the Jewish Community Service Society officially became Jewish Family Service of Buffalo & Erie County

in 1960.

Today, the NYS-licensed JFS Mental Health/Behavioral Health Outpatient Clinic offers compassionate, confidential care that helps individuals of all ages struggling with mental health challenges improve their quality of life — and helps their families define and implement ways to support them. "We are among the few resources in Western New York with the ability to deliver mental health care with an understanding of Jewish faith and culture that can improve overall counseling and treatment outcomes," Schillinger says. "This is especially critical considering the current epidemic of prescription drug abuse, which sometimes is connected to undiagnosed or untreated behavioral and mental health disorders."

JFS also hopes to increase Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) certification within the Jewish community.

MHFA is an international training and education program that teaches people how to identify, understand signs of mental illnesses and substance use disorders, and to respond appropriately to someone who may be experiencing a crisis. JFS offers the training to individuals and groups in partnership with Compeer Buffalo and the Erie County Mental Health Association: in October, the cooperative initiative earned an award from the P2 Collaborative of Western New York.

"Because over 1200 people in Western New York received a certificate by taking the eight-hour Mental Health First Aid training, hundreds of lives can be saved," says Schillinger.

The newly added presence will include detailed information on services tailored to serve Buffalo's Jewish community. "Our Jewish Community counts on us to provide high quality, confidential and compassionate services that reflect and respect our cultural and faith traditions," says JFS Board Chair Blaine Schwartz, Esq.

"This is why we were founded. But from elder care and care coordination to career counseling, resettlement, mental and behavioral health care, Jewish Family Service of Buffalo & Erie County is committed to extending a lifeline to help all who come through our doors meet the challenges of life change."

"Nuremberg Trials 70 Years Later – Legal Ethics and the Holocaust"

A Continuing Legal Education program (CLE) on the Nuremberg Trials-Legal Ethics and the Holocaust was held October 28, sponsored by Holocaust Resource Center, Erie County Bar Association, **Buffalo Jewish Federation and the Robert** H. Jackson Center was a sold out, wellreceivedprogram! More than 100 lawyers and community members gathered in the Jury Assembly Room inside the Robert H. Jackson Federal Court House in Buffalo, that day. Several presenters and participants said it was the best CLE they have attended in their career.

The series of presentations included "How the Third Reich dismantled the German legal system for its own purposes," and details of the Nuremberg Trials including the Alstoetter Trial (focused trial on the judges) which was presented by Hon. Lawrence J. Vilardo, US District Judge Western District of New York) and raised the ultimate ethical issue of what would you do if that happened

Highlights included Professor John Q. Barrett from St. John's University School of Law who described the

Nuremberg Trials and Justice Robert H. Jackson's role as the chief prosecutor, and Honorable Howard Gutman, former Ambassador to Belgium, who shared his family history of survival during the Shoah in Poland.

The dais and topics also included Judges of the Third Reich by Hon. Eugene M. Fahey, NYS State Court of Appeals; and Ethical Responses to Immoral Laws by Professor James G. Milles, University at Buffalo School of Law.

Referring to the Nuremberg Trials and the key Nazi defense of separating laws from ethics, Judge Fahey said "it was a moral nightmare; abandonment of the law doesn't require the abandonment of morals." He admitted that, "The language of the Nuremberg Laws and the judges' rulings is very difficult to read publicly. But we need to do this; to learn so that we don't recreate this dangerous time...."

The Q&A was moderated by Vincent E. Doyle III, Esq. Connors LLP, former President, and NYSBA.

YOM KIPPUR REMEMBRANCE IN RHODES, GREECE

In planning a much anticipated trip to Santorini, Rhodes and Athens, Greece, my research included Jewish museums, landmarks and neighborhoods to visit. Knowing I would be in Rhodes over Yom Kippur, I was so excited to learn that in the Jewish Quarter (La Juderia), High Holiday services are held at Kamal Shalom. This is the only remaining Synagogue in Rhodes, built in 1577, and the oldest in all of Greece.

The Jewish community of Rhodes has a rich and tragic historical background dating back to ancient times. Over the last five hundred years, a large number of Sephardic Jews, who fled Spain at the time of the Spanish Inquisition traveled across the Mediterranean and settled in Rhodes, Izmir, Salonica and Istanbul. These Jews brought their customs, traditions and their language called "Ladino" and "Judeo-Spanish". The Jewish community of 4,000 and five synagogues thrived until the 1930's. Things gradually changed when the Italian government took over and passed anti-Jewish laws. A curfew was imposed, travel was restricted, Jewish schools closed and the Sabbath was no longer allowed to be observed. Over one hundred families were ordered to leave. Many others fled.

On July 23, 1944, the Germans invaded and arrested 1673 Jews (except for 42 Turkish Jews). They were treated brutally and then sent to Auschwitz. Only 151 survived. Another flourishing Sephardic community of the Mediterranean ceased to exist. In 1946, the first Mayor of a free Rhodes named the central square, the Square of the Jewish Martyrs. It was a unanimous resolution of the City Council, being the first official recognition of the Holocaust on behalf of a Greek authority.

Along with my travel companion Ed Mezvinsky*, we were welcomed to join both the service and break- fast. We would be joining the few remaining Jewish residents along with expats who traveled from Israel, England and as far away as the Congo. Located in Old Town where there are no cars allowed, we found the synagogue nestled in a hidden alleyway. The weathered doors with the original stone mezuzah did not prepare us for the magnificent restored interior. One immediately sees and feels the Turkish influence. The floor is decorated with black and white mosaic

stones patterns, large elegant hanging crystal chandeliers, heavy pillars to the ceiling that anchor the room, numerous elaborate wall paintings, two silk draped arks that were on either side of the entrance to the courtyard, and a hand carved raised bimah in the center. It took my breath away.

Once I settled into my seat in the women's section, I felt the presence of many generations of what was once a vibrant and beautiful community over hundreds of years. The balcony that was originally built for the women is no longer used, but adds to the richness of the architecture. There was another presence I felt, which emotionally stirred within me. My daughter, Rachel, recently married a lovely young man whose grandparents came from Rhodes. I had framed a photograph of this handsome couple for the wedding and I could see their faces and felt my extended family with me. Now I am both smiling and teary.

There were a total of only thirty five people. Men were called to the Torah for an alivah. Ed was raised Orthodox and is well-versed in reading and chanting in Hebrew. When he finished his Aliyah, he

did not leave the bimah. Instead he continued to chant and I realized he was reciting the Haftorah. For a minute, his voice quivered with deep emotion. He chanted with kavenah. (and this was one long Haftorah!) I asked him what went through his mind. He said, "It was an emotional remembrance of his family Jewish roots that trace back from Ames, Iowa, as the son of immigrant parents from Czarist Russia (now the Ukraine) and Poland. He added that he reflected on his Bar Mitzvah and felt deeply honored and humbled by the experience.

For the last nine years, Sam Amiel travels from Israel to lead the services with his two sons. He has family roots in Rhodes and made *aliyah* from Seattle. He works for The Joint Distribution Committee (JDC) in Israel, and he says he does his work in Rhodes "from his soul."

We broke the Yom Kippur fast with our new friends, eating delicious traditional Greek food. No bagel and lox here! Sitting together on the rooftop after the services looking over the Jewish Quarter under the moon was beyond magical. It was a memorable experience and the highlight of the trip. It brought in a New Year experience that I will never forget.





"C" IS FOR CATARACT

Tataract, which is clouding of the eye lens, affects more than half of Americans aged 65 years and older. This age-related cause of vision loss can occur much earlier due to exposure to the sun's ultraviolet (UV) rays and a host of other causes (including smoking, use of

corticosteroids, and a family history). It is also thought that cataract formation is linked to oxidative changes in the human eye lens, which makes the case for consuming fruits and vegetables containing high amounts of antioxidants. In fact, recent research involving 324 pairs of twins over a decade showed there was a 33 percent lower risk of developing cataracts among women whose diets were rich in

foods containing vitamin C. The symptoms of early cataracts may be improved with new eyeglasses, brighter lighting, anti-glare sunglasses, or magnifying lenses. If these measures do not help, surgery is the only effective treatment. To learn more, please call


