Princeton Rabbi to lead Buffalo Hillel

Hillel of Buffalo is pleased to announce the appointment of Rabbi Sara Rich as the Hillel Foundation's new director. The successful search that landed Rabbi Sara was led by Hadar Borden and Marc Adler, both of whom are associated with University at Buffalo.

Rabbi Sara brings a wealth of experience to the position, having served the past six years as the Director of Education of Princeton's Center for Jewish Life/Hillel. In her role, Rabbi Sara taught classes on topics such as Jewish Biomedical Ethics and engaged students in conversation about leadership and Jewish identity, the college experience, and leadership.

"Sara is an intelligent, warm, dynamic woman," writes Scott Brown, former VP of Talent for Hillel International and current Executive Coach. "She will bring her rabbinic know-how and her ability to connect with all types of Jewish students and her experience creating meaningful programs at Princeton University to Hillel of Buffalo and the entire community."

Rabbi Sara is a strong emerging leader in the Hillel movement. She has received specialized training through the Weinberg Accelerate Executive Training Program to prepare her to lead a Hillel as the executive director. Mimi Kravetz, Hillel's Chief Talent Officer notes, "We're thrilled that Sara is now joining Hillel of Buffalo as the

Sara is a graduate of the University of Maryland, College Park and received her ordination from Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion. She received a certificate in Experiential Jewish Education from Yeshiva University and has participated in learning programs at Limmud New York, Yeshivat Hadar, the Drisha Institute for Jewish Education, and the Pardes Institute for Jewish Studies. Later this spring, Sara will be moving to Williamsville with her husband, Ezra, and their daughters Miriam and Sivan.

The Fellowship provides up to three years of exclusive training in pluralistic Jewish education, including immersive Jewish learning, seminars in experiential Jewish education, and career coaching. Fellows also work with some of the most innovative organizations in contemporary Jewish life, including Mechon Hadar, M2, iCenter, and more.

In his current role, Logan is responsible for planning student programs, mentoring leaders, and engaging students across Buffalo. As an Ezra Fellow, he will add an educational dimension to his work, one that is a natural use of his talents and interests. "Logan will excel in this role because of his deep Jewish knowledge, his love of building substantive relationships with students, and his bright vision for the impact that Hillel can have on the student experience on campus and beyond," says Rabbi Sara Rich, incoming Executive Director of the Hillel of Buffalo. Past Federation President Ann Holland Cohn (1926-2017) z"l

Past Federation President Ann Holland Cohn passed away March 25 in Houston, Texas, where she had moved four years ago to be closer to one of her daughters. She was active with leading Jewish and Western New York organizations for over 50 years. She left Buffalo, the Jewish Community and the Jewish Community Center much better places than she found them when she first arrived in Buffalo as a child.

She served as president of the Rosa Coplon Home from 1978-1980, and president of the Jewish Federation of Greater Buffalo from 1984-1986. She was also president of the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies and sat on the boards of the Buffalo Seminary, the Buffalo Chapter of the American Red Cross, The Jewish Community Center, Jewish Federation Housing (now Jewish Federation Apartments), Temple Beth Zion, and chaired the former Federation's Women's Division of the United Jewish Fund Campaign, now called Women's Philanthropy. She also was very committed to Hospice Buffalo.

A large poster hanging today in the lobbies of both Jewish Community Centers with a photo of Ann and JCC Executive Director Rick Zakalik reads the following: "Ann was a dear friend and generous supporter of the JCC who will be missed. Her mark on our community is everywhere. Ann was among the last of a group of strong women who led before it was fashionable to do so. Ann supported the Holland Family Building with a generous endowment. Children's programs and arts were among her favorite interests. Her kindness, graciousness, generosity and wit are a memorable blessing. Her soul will be bound up with those who have attained greatness through quiet, kind and compassionate acts. May God bless her soul. She will be forever present in our hearts."

Rick Zakalik, Executive Director of the JCC said of Ann, "while Ann's monetary generosity was exemplary, and included a million dollar gift which ensured the viability and sustainability of the Holland Family Building and encouraged large future gifts to the

JCC, her generosity of spirit was too great to measure. If you an admired a plant in her garden, you were likely to find a piece of it sprouting on your doorstep the next morning. People new to community volunteer work were immediately welcomed by Ann and mentored in a caring and grateful manner. Ann's quick wit, wealth of historical insight and kind smile were gifts she was eager to share. While we are grateful for the decades of leadership Ann gave us, we are at a loss for her equal."

Peter Fleischmann, Director of the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies hosted a luncheon for Ann before she moved to Houston at the Burchfield Penney Art Center. The memorable event in June 2013 was attended by members of Ann's family and representatives from over 16 nonprofit agencies and charitable organizations which Ann has supported for decades as a volunteer, board member and major donor. Peter Fleischmann served as Master of Ceremonies and praised Ann for her "years of service, leadership and generosity." He thanked Ann for her unwavering commitment to our community and expressed our collective gratitude to her for all she has done to improve the quality of life in Western New York.

He said "It was really Ann's commitment to the Delaware Avenue JCC Building and that neighborhood that stimulated the major donor involvement to renovate it, modernize it and turn it into the viable community center that it is today. She wanted the Jewish Center to be a place of pride for the Jewish community and the entire city," he said. Fleischmann also announced that the Jewish Community Center was dedicating the Grounds and Gardens at the Holland Family Building on Delaware Avenue in honor of Ann and would display one of Ann's paintings in the lobby of the Center. Ann was a longtime Art Teacher at the Center and an avid gardener.

A Dover, Delaware native, she was a talented painter and sculptor who taught art and painting as a volunteer at the JCC for decades, and an expert gardener. She was the daughter of the late Henry and late Regina Holland, wife of the late neurosurgeon Dr. George Cohen, and mother of the late neurosurgeon Dr. Kenneth Cohn. She is survived by her son, Thomas Cohn, her daughters Martha Claussen and Erica and their husbands, her daughter-in-law, Diane, and several grandchildren.

Avy Sterman to be honored at Kadimah Dinner June 12

As Buffalo garners new attention nationwide for its renewed growth and renaissance, Kadimah Academy will once again gather hundreds of people from diverse sectors of the community to celebrate Jewish Buffalo's new potential and the importance of Jewish education for the future. Thus, this year's Dinner will honor the school's past, with all that Sterman has given to the Jewish community, and look ahead at the bright future of Jewish Buffalo and the greater Buffalo region, as demonstrated by Jemal's significant investment. "Past, present and future will come together this year, as we not only remember from whence we came but also look to where we are going as a community," said Kadimah Board President Jonathan D. Epstein. "Buffalo is positioned to take its place once again as a city on the rise, and Jewish Buffalo should be in the forefront of its success. To achieve this goal, a thriving day school must be at the center of our collective efforts."

Sterman, a Buffalo native and salesman extraordinaire, has been involved in the

Jewish community for over 50 years. He served overseas in World War II, and worked a series of jobs that led him "up the corporate ladder" to eventually become President of Hy-Grade Distributors, a local company with annual sales of over \$25 million. When Sterman sold his share in the company in 1996, he started Avrom Sales Company, while devoting more time to his religious and philanthropic involvement.

Sterman's involvement in the greater

Buffalo community has spanned from his service as a two-time chair of the Buffalo Jewish Federation's United Jewish Fund Campaign, and past president of Temple Shaarey Tzedek, Chabad House and Montefiore Lodge 70 of B'nai Brith, to his roles at Kadimah as trustee, advocate and major fundraiser for the past 20 years. "I'm honored to be this year's Dinner honoree and to express to the community why a Iewish education is vital to the success of our youth," said Sterman. "But remaining involved in the Jewish community after graduating from Kadimah is key to our community's ability to thrive for years to come."

Every year, Sterman encourages dozens of local philanthropists to sponsor the Kadimah Dinner, providing thousands of dollars for scholarship assistance every year. Without his dedication, the school's major annual fundraising event would not be the success it has become.

"I see the difference that Kadimah education has made in the lives of kids who are now grown up, and succeeding in various fields, while holding onto a strong Jewish identity," said Sterman. "Kadimah really prepares students to excel in high school and college and then launch their lives successfully."

While Sterman has been a proven backbone to the Jewish community for decades, this year's featured speaker, Douglas Jemal, brings a breath of fresh air to the Buffalo region. Jemal is the founder and CEO of Douglas Development Corp., the second-largest commercial real estate developer in the Washington, D.C., area, and one of the most successful when it comes to historic and adaptive-reuse projects.

Jemal, who is Jewish, has achieved a reputation for taking on older, underused buildings and challenging projects in the nation's capital, turning them into vibrant new destinations. He recently burst onto Buffalo's burgeoning development scene, acquiring the region's only skyscraper and announcing plans to invest more than \$100 million to redevelop it into a 21st-century mixed-use complex. Jemal has been a philanthropist in Washington, donating notably to Children's Hospital, Columbia Lighthouse for the Blind, the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation and other organizations. And he's been honored with various economic development, historic preservation, civic and humanitarian awards.

The poem, "Woman of Valor," comes from the Book of Proverbs. In Hebrew, a "Woman of Valor" is Eshet Chayil and it is a lewish custom for many husbands to sing or recite this poem to their wives when welcoming in Shabbat, and thinking about and expressing gratitude for all his wife has done for him and their family throughout the past week. It is really a beautiful poem. The English translation is as follows:

A Woman of Valor-seek her out, for she is to be valued above rubies.

Her husband trusts her, and they cannot fail to prosper.

All the days of her life she is good to him.

She opens her hands to those in need and offers her help to the poor.

Adorned with strength and dignity, she looks to the future with cheerful trust.

Her speech is wise, and the law of kindness is on her lips.

Her children rise up to call her blessed.

her husband likewise praises her: 'Many women have done well, but

you surpass them all.'

Charm is deceptive and beauty short-lived.

but a woman loyal to God has truly earned praise.

Give her honor for her work; her life proclaims her praise.

In Hebrew, this poem has an acrostic arrangement in which the verses begin with the letters of the Hebrew alphabet in order. According to some noted Jewish scholars, the Eshet Chayil poem was originally composed by Abraham as a eulogy for his wife Sarah. According to Kabbalah-Jewish mysticism-this poem is a reference to the "Shabbat Queen," the spiritual soulmate of the Jewish people. It has also been interpreted as a reference to the Shechinah (Divine presence), the Torah, wisdom and the Jewish soul.

To me, this poem represents a sign of respect to all women and the various meaningful roles reflected in our homes, at work and in our community. Our Buffalo Jewish community is fortunate to have many leading ladies and an active and dynamic presence. At the Lion of Judah conference last September, 9 women from our community attended out of a total of 1300 women. In February, our WNY community had 11 representatives on the Heart-2-Heart

Mission to Israel, the largest delegation of any community out of the 66 women who attended, and in June, over 350 women will attend our community's Women of Distinction luncheon where Viola Sterman will be honored, among many other well-deserved women, as Jewish Federation's nominee. Viola has been and continues to be a role model for many in our community, including my wife, Ellen, who followed Viola as the Women's Philanthropy Chair several years ago. Our Federation staff includes ten women, each of whom is doing an amazing job. Dr. Gerhard Falk publishes 25th Book

Dr. Gerhard Falk, a scholar and historian, has published his 25th book, The Assault on Democracy. This book describes the centuries old struggle of Western Europeans and Americans to gain freedom and rights for the individual, with the result that American democracy finally succeeded in the 18th century. The book then shows that there are many Americans, born in this country, who seek to undermine freedom by such methods as killing abortion doctors, promoting anti-Jewish hate on college campuses, stealing the taxpayer's money while holding political office, and engaging in racist conduct.

Dr. Falk has published several books of Jewish interest including The American Jewish Community, The Jew in Christian Theology,



The Restoration of Israel and The German Jews in America. He has also published in the area of criminology, including *Murder*: An analysis of its Forms, Conditions and Causes; Assassination, Anarchy and Terrorism; Fraud and Deceit Among Scientists and The American Criminal Justice System.

Dr. Falk's other books deal with various aspects of social change, including End of the Patriarchy; Women and Social Change; Sex and Gender: The Great Revolution.

Dr. Ursula Falk (Gerhard's wife) and Dr. Gerhard Falk are co-authors with Dr. Thomas Weinberg of a forthcoming book The American Drug Culture. Together the Falks have also written The Youth Culture and the Generation Gap; Deviant Nurses and Improper Patient Care; Grandparents: a New Look at the Supporting Generation; Aging in America and Other Cultures; and The Nursing Home Dilemma.

Dr. Gerhard Falk has won the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence; the Buffalo State College Presidents' Award for Creativity and the SUNY Research Foundation Award for Scholarship. Both Dr. Ursula Falk and Dr. Gerhard Falk are Holocaust survivors who have lived in Buffalo for 60 years. They are members of the Jewish Community Center and Temple Beth Tzedek.

Reflecting on a Decade of Service at Temple Beth Zion

Serving the community in which I grew up lends itself to advantages: knowledge of family connections, Jewish businesses and retelling my favorite 'urban Jewish myth' of Buffalo-that all Jewish people in Buffalo are really just descendants from 4 families. All the while, serving the community in which i grew up presents itself with its own sets of challenges. Examples: "Really Mr. So and So, I am not the same person as the 12 year-old girl who used to hide in the bowels of Temple Beth El during USY shul-ins. Yes, it was me, Mrs. So and So, the same 'Penny Sonnenreich 'who hung out in the Braille room of Temple Beth Am during NELFTY events."

I have served Temple Beth Zion for a quarter of my life and, no, I didn't grow up at this shul. I became Bat Mitzvah at Temple Beth Am and in high school switched to Temple Sinai, all while my grandparents (z"l) were longtime members of Beth David Ner Tamid, living through every iteration to what we now know as Temple Beth Tzedek. This is a characteristic all so familiar here in WNY. One of the most unique traits about Buffalo is how every family is connected in one way or another to most

of the synagogues at any given time.

Although I have been back in Western New York from North Carolina (Go Tar Heels!) since 2002, I first came back to serve Temple Sinai until 2006, and then moved to Beth Zion.

This past February during Shabbat Shira (Sabbath of Song), the community of Temple Beth Zion honored my decade of service. The evening was blustery, and even good friends from Toronto couldn't make it in due to the storm. However, much to my surprise and delight, the sanctuary was packed and the evening was warm and so memorable. A moment that will be crystallized in my memory forever occurred when fellow colleague and dear friend Hazzan Irwin Gelman spoke sweet words of Torah on my behalf and blessed me. How deeply powerful to have that treasure bestowed upon me by him! I was beyond humbled and felt extremely undeserving of such *zchus* (good fortune).

I wish to share with you what I offered in my clergy column this past February in the Bulletin of Temple Beth Zion, whose congregation I have come to love dearly:

"Sometimes, on our bimah, I gaze out into the congregation and see all of you, and I have come to know your stories, your blessings and your own personal journeys into Judaism. Crust:

 2 c graham cracker crumbs...can use chocolate wafer crumbs instead
 1 stick butter. melted

1/4 c sugar

Mix all together till combined and press onto bottom and up sides of pan.

Bake for 5-7 minutes till golden. Turn oven off and let it cool... (this is the secret step! You want to put cheesecake into a cool oven.)

Filling:

32 oz. cream cheese, room temp.

- 4 eggs, room temp
- 1 c sugar
- 1 Tbsp. flour
- 2 tsp. vanilla (can use lemon or almond extract instead)

Put cream cheese into mixing bowl and add sugar and flour. Beat till just combined...you don't want to add too much air to mix. Add eggs, one at a time along with vanilla till combined. Pour filling into baked crust and place in cool oven. Turn oven to 375 and bake 40 minutes. Take out of oven to cool while mixing topping.



2 c sour cream 4 Tbsp. sugar 1 tsp. yapilla

1 tsp. vanilla

Mix all together. Spread on top of cooled cheesecake and bake at 375 for 5 minutes.

Cool overnight in fridge before serving.





Hannah is the US Coordinator and Chief Financial Officer. Both serve as volunteers and are significant donors through their Norman and Hannah Weinberg Charitable Fund, administered by the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies.

Their first very first project was restoration of the Jewish cemetery in Norman's ancestral "former shtetl" of Ozarow.

The Weinbergs were honored at the US Embassy in Warsaw, in May 2006, celebrating the 5th year of operations of the Poland Jewish Cemeteries Restoration Project (<u>www.pjcrp.org</u>). They are recipients of many other awards.

The Weinbergs are proud co-founders and supporters of the Foundation for Holocaust Education, an organization which provides Holocaust education to students in the US, Poland, Belgium and soon in Israel. Students in the Foundation's highly-acclaimed school play, "Who Restored My Soul" act out the stories of actual Survivors. Shir Shalom Is Founding Synagogue For Rocks Of Unity Project

In a world increasingly driven by fear, mistrust and conflict, Alexa Zappia has launched a rapidly growing community effort that instead stresses kindness, acceptance, diversity and unity. Nice concepts, but far more powerful when backed up by action, determination and drive. And that's just what Ms. Zappia, a member of Congregation Shir Shalom, is doing.

Her "Rocks of Unity" initiative has prompted several thousand students – from the elementary grades to college seniors — to decorate garden rocks with symbols of positive self-image or inclusiveness. The rocks — the centerpiece of Ms. Zappia's "Rocks of Unity" program are then permanently attached to highlyvisible public places as constant reminders of decency and hope.

From 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. on May 21st, students from the Gesher religious school, which is housed at Shir Shalom, will place their self-designed rocks around the existing larger stone honoring Cantor Susan Wehle, who died in a plane crash in Clarence in 2009. Ms. Zappia, then 12, was very close to Cantor Wehle, and helped her with a variety of programs at what was then Temple Beth Am. Ms. Zappia's Bat Mitzvah was the last at which Cantor Wehle officiated and the fatal crash was Ms. Zappia's first encounter with tragedy. But even in death, Cantor Wehle's memory helped Ms. Zappia work through her pain. "She wouldn't want me to sit in a corner and sulk," said Ms. Zappia, who is now 20. "She would want me to be active."

Shir Shalom remained Ms. Zappia's place to grow and contribute. Just as she did with Cantor Wehle, she developed a very strong connection with Cantor Sharon Colbert. Accumulating 1,400 volunteer hours at Shir Shalom, Ms. Zappia helped

Cantor Colbert with the children's choir, talent shows, administrative details and even the planning of services. "She and I have a very close bond," said Ms. Zappia. "I think of her as part of my family." Cantor Colbert has since retired and now lives in Houston.

If Cantors Colbert and Wehle are family, Shir Shalom is home. When Hope Bongiono was hired as Religious School Director about four years ago, Ms. Zappia told her about her work with the cantors and offered to assist as well in the Religious School. "I almost fell down," said Ms. Bongiono. "She's just a dynamo. She is a kind and sensitive person. I think she's offended by injustice."

Ms. Zappia, a graduate of Williamsville South High School, took her values and determination along to St. John Fisher College in suburban Rochester, where she is a junior majoring in inclusive childhood education and serves as Vice President of the Teacher Education Student Association. "I have realized that in a world filled with so much intolerance of others based on our differences, we must respond by affirming diversity as strength through kindness and acceptance," said Ms. Zappia, the daughter of Tracie Zappia, a former member of Beth Am's Board of Trustees. "In order to stop the spread of intolerance, change must occur. Instead of merely being present, we must be active. I am willing to take on the

responsibility in order to make a better society for our future."

With what Ms. Zappia describes as a "driven mind-set," she is making a difference at St. John Fisher. Her first collegiate Rocks for Unity effort there was a rousing success, including an agreement with college administrators to display the rocks on the outside wall of a prominent campus building. "An hour before the event, we had a line that wrapped all across the campus center, and even outside on the steps of the campus quad," she said. "There was an hour's wait (to decorate rocks) because we had so much participation. It truly was heartwarming and remarkable."

In addition, Ms. Zappia posts a "daily dose of kindness" on social media outlets. Ms. Zappia, who has attracted media attention in Rochester, is now seeking to interest high-visibility television shows. "I want this to go national" she said. "It's a national issue." *The project's website is: https://alexazappia.wixsite.com/rocksofunity.*

Rabbi Isaac Klein Scholar In Residence Weekend At Temple Beth Tzedek June 9 - 11, 2017



JCC Arts & Book Fair US and Israeli–Two Soldiers' Stories Tuesday, May 16, 7 p.m.

Burchfield Penney Arts Center Auditorium

The JCC Cultural Arts Program and Just Buffalo Literary Center will collaborate to present a community program called "Two Soldiers' Stories: Lebanon, Iraq & Back," featuring best-selling authors Brian Castner and Matti Friedman and, Tuesday, May 16 at 7 p.m. in the Burchfield Penney Arts Center Auditorium, 1300 Elmwood Avenue, Buffalo, NY.

This innovative educational program will help to connect the community with US military and Israeli military experiences as well as share insights into human experiences from two soldiers who served different cultures and countries (Canada/Israel and USA) in their respective wars.

Brian Castner is a Buffalo-born war veteran turned memoirist, who served three tours of duty in the Middle East. Castner served as an Explosive Ordnance Disposal officer in the US Air Force from 1999 to 2007, deploying to Iraq to command bomb disposal units in Balad and Kirkuk in 2005 and 2006. His memoir *The Long Walk: A Story of War and the Life That Follows*, is the story of his struggle to survive modern combat in Iraq and his personal tale of confronting the new person he had become upon returning to his family. Castner astonishes audiences with his powerful and harrowing story of the terror, excitement, and camaraderie of combat, and the lonely battle against the unshakable fear, anxiety, and survivor guilt that he—like so many veterans—carries inside.

Afterleaving the active military, Castner became a consultant and contractor, training Army and Marine Corps units prior to their tours in Iraq and Afghanistan. His writing has appeared in a number of national and regional publications, including *The Wall Street Journal, Newsweek, Foreign Policy, Publishers Weekly,* and Garry Trudeau's *The Sandbox,* an online forum for dispatches by

Iraq and Afghanistan service members.

Toronto-born Matti Friedman was a reporter and editor in the Jerusalem bureau of *The Associated Press* (AP) news agency between 2006 and the end of 2011. During his journalistic career, he also worked as a reporter in Egypt, Morocco, Lebanon, Moscow and Washington, D.C.

Following the 2014 Israel–Gaza conflict, Friedman wrote an essay criticizing what he views as the international media's bias against Israel and undue focus on the country, stating that news organizations treat it as the "most important story on earth". He said when he was a correspondent at AP, "the agency had more than 40 staffers covering Israel and the Palestinian territories. That was significantly more news staff than the AP had in China, Russia, or India, or in all of the 50 countries of sub-Saharan Africa combined. It was higher than the total number of news-gathering employees in all the countries where the uprisings of the 'Arab Spring' eventually erupted."

Friedman's first book, *The Aleppo Codex:* A True Story of Obsession, Faith and the Pursuit of an Ancient Bible, was published in May 2012 by Algonquin Books. The book is an account of how the Aleppo Codex, "the oldest, most complete, most accurate text of the Hebrew Bible," came to reside in Israel. It was believed the codex had been destroyed during the 1947 Anti-Jewish riots in Aleppo when the Central Synagogue of Aleppo, where the codex was housed, was set on fire and badly damaged. In the book, Friedman also investigates how and why many of the codex's pages went missing and what their fate might be.

The Aleppo Codex won the 2014 Sami Rohr Prize for Jewish Literature, was selected as one of *Booklist's* top ten religion and spirituality books of 2012, was awarded the American Library Association's 2013 Sophie Brody Medal and the 2013 Canadian Jewish Book Award for history, and received second place for the Religion News writers Association's 2013 nonfiction religion book of the year.

Friedman's most recent book, Pumpkinflowers: A Soldier's Story of a Forgotten War (Algonquin 2016) focuses on the Israeli occupation of Lebanon. The title is derived from the name of the hill in Lebanon, Pumpkin, and the military code word for casualties, "flowers." Yossi Klein Halevi, author of Like Dreamers, describes the book as "Inspiring, heartbreaking, illuminating...Part memoir, part reportage, part military history, this powerful narrative captures the birth of today's chaotic Middle East and the rise of a twenty-first-century type of war in which there is never a clear victor, and media images can be as important as the battle itself."

This event will include presentations from both authors about their experiences and how they came to write their respective books, as well as a discussion and O&A with the audience. Both authors will be available for book sales and signings following the event. "Two Soldiers' Stories: Lebanon, Iraq & Back" is sponsored by the Jewish Community Center of Greater Buffalo, Just Buffalo Literary Center, the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies, the Buffalo Jewish Federation and Gabe and Andrea Ferber. April 2017 Update from Weinberg Campus

Weinberg Campus has been making great strides forward over the past year, especially when it comes to the quality of care we provide to our residents. All that hard work has paid off with our Rosa Coplon Living Center (nursing home and post-acute rehabilitation) receiving two top quality ratings from New York State and the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. First, Rosa Coplon was named a Top Performer by the New York State Department of Health, one of 22 Western New York organizations to receive a top 20% designation for high quality skilled nursing care. [https://www. health.ny.gov/health care/medicaid/ redesign/nhqi/2016/1st_quintile.htm]

In addition, the federal government's 5-Star Rating system placed Rosa Coplon as a 4-Star facility. Over the past 15 months, Rosa Coplon has steadily improved in this rating system, which looks at survey inspections, quality

measures and staffing in comparison to all nursing homes in the country. Rosa was one of eight facilities in the Western New York region to be rated Above Average. [https://www.medicare.gov/ nursinghomecompare/search.html]

These excellent ratings are a result of the focused efforts of the Rosa Coplon team under the leadership of the administrator, Bill Gillick, and are a tribute to all of the staff who provide care to the 180 residents at Rosa Coplon. We hope that our whole community will take notice of this achievement.

There is not much to update the community on in regard to our process to sell the campus facilities. While the majority of the campus will be sold as one package, there will be some components that are sold either before or after as separate deals. Weinberg remains in negotiations, which will continue until agreements are reached, contracts signed and deposits are received. Once a contract is signed and a deposit is received, then New York State must approve the transfer of the licenses, which can take a year or more. While this process is lengthy, Weinberg is committed to continuing its work to enhance quality, attract new residents and provide resources for staff.

Wednesday, May 17 at the fifth and final lecture in the "Exploration of Justice in Jewish Thought" series co-sponsored by the University at Buffalo's Department of Jewish Thought and the Bureau of Jewish Education. His very timely topic will be: "Can a Law be Unjust? - Talmudic and Contemporary Perspectives." Dr.

Dolgopolski is an Associate Professor and Chair of the Department of Jewish Thought. Professor Dogopolski explains how the newly established Department of Jewish Thought at UB stands at a critical point as it expands its efforts to attract faculty and students, develop academic and community outreach programs, and build its infrastructure. To realize the vision and the potential of this new department, he points out the vital need and help of the community to lend its financial support, so they can offer scholarships and fellowships, workshops and conferences, library materials and adult education programs for students and life-long learners in the community.

The month of May ends with Memorial Day, the holiday of Shavuot and my last day as Director of the Adult Department at the Bureau of Jewish Education. I will be writing more about my thirteen years with the BJE in the June issue of the Federation's *Jewish Journal*.

A COMMUNITY MEMORABILIA TREASURE TROVE

Of the over sixty different collections organized under the Jewish Buffalo Archives Project, one of the most unusual, is a group of boxes that comprise the collection, "Individual and Community Memorabilia, 1890s-2016 (bulk 1942/1987)." Together, they form a truly unique resource of photographs, speeches, clippings, writings, minutes, printed materials, memorabilia and more! Drawn from personal and organizational materials, they include donations from individuals and families who saved items that had meaning from specific moments in their lives, or in the lives of family members.

A gilt engraved cup given to a volunteer officer of the Jewish Mother's Club sheds light on women's volunteerism and local Jewish organizational life. School of Citizenship and Literacy certificates highlight acculturating immigrant efforts. A pharmaceutical formula book, with handwritten entries from over a century ago, documents the movement into the professions. Clippings highlighting Jewish volunteer work, and fraternity and sorority photographs capture many moments of fellowship.


The range of items is very broad, and it includes "missing items" from organizational archives, interspersed with unique family items. Delving into these records is to see the breadth of participation within Jewish agencies and smaller organizations across time. From the Knights of Pythias to the Family Shul, the Individual and Community Memorabilia Collection is a treasure trove!



MAY IS MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH: Make Mental Wellness Your Priority With JFS

We live in a hectic world where there never seems to be enough time to juggle all the adult daily living tasks at hand. As a result, maintaining mental wellness can be difficult for anyone — and is often more challenging for people who live with a mental health disorder. Yet despite consistent advertising of medications to help manage anxiety and depression, mental illness remains among the most stigmatized of medical challenges.

"This is an unfortunate reality that continues to impact on our overall health and well-being. Untreated mental health issues connect to many chronic medical conditions such as hypertension and obesity, which in turn can lead to diabetes, heart disease and other serious illnesses. In every form, for any reason, stigma is damaging to the individual or group being stereotyped, and to the society as a whole," JFS president and CEO Marlene Schillinger says.


Jewish Family Service of Buffalo & Erie County has provided comprehensive New York State-licensed mental and behavioral health diagnosis, counseling and treatment since the 1950s. Its confidential, client-centered care is delivered by compassionate medical and social service professionals and available to children, adults, seniors and families.

"In recognition of National Mental Health Awareness Month, and Children's Mental Health Awareness Week from May 1 to 7, we are encouraging anyone who thinks they or someone they love may be experiencing a mental health issue to reach out to JFS," Schillinger says.

"We especially encourage parents to call if they are concerned about a child who might benefit from help. Parents sometimes choose not to acknowledge warning signs their children exhibit for many reasons, including fear of labels such as 'crazy' or 'threatening,' that often follow individuals with mental health challenge."

Warning signs that young children may benefit from psychiatric assessment include, among others, behavior changes and acting out aggressively. Red flags for older children and adolescents may include sudden withdrawal from family and friends changes in mood, physical complaints self-harming, engaging in high-risk behaviors and substance abuse.

"It is important for families to overcome stereotypes, educate themselves and accept that mental illness does not have to define the individual who is struggling with it," Schillinger advises.



In addition to its clinic, JFS works with the Erie County Anti-Stigma Coalition and provides Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) training to help people of all ages better understand how to manage the social stigma connected to mental illness and respond appropriately to individuals who may be experiencing a mental health crisis. Under the umbrella of the Erie County Department of Mental Health, the agency collaborates with 15 other area mental and behavioral health providers to define ways to change regional attitude and behavior toward people with mental health challenges.

"We want to promote the idea of mental wellness as opposed to mental illness, to promote prevention and raise awareness among the general public that recovery is possible," reports Erie County Commissioner of Mental Health Michael R. Ranney, CRC-R, LMHC, who oversees the initiative which began in 2015.

Schillinger is a founder of the alliance, which is launching a comprehensive, long-term education campaign this month. Primary outreach targets include people who manage a mental illness, families and caregivers; the general public, opinion leaders, primary care physicians, mental health community partners and managed care organizations.

Part of the campaign will direct people to the international, evidence-

based MHFA program which teaches individuals, employers and groups to better understand mental illness; identify and respond to a mental health emergency, and ways to reduce the associated stigma. JFS partners with Compeer and the Mental Health Association of Erie County to provide the training, which has now certified more than 1200 people in Western New York. In 2015, the partnership was recognized by the P2Collaborative of Western New York for "stigma-reducing advocacy and education."

"The more people we can get into Mental Health First Aid, the better. I think it is a starting point to get the dialogue going," says Schillinger, who is certified as a MHFA trainer.

At the end of the day, JFS is focused on helping clients develop tools and define strategies for maintaining mental wellness and managing stigma they must often confront. "For someone who thinks they may have a mental health challenge, getting treatment is the first and most important step. And JFS is here to help."




Charles Gelman was a teenager in Poland in June 1941 when the Holocaust had finally reached Kurenits, near the Soviet border. Gelman lost his family, and felt the cold, dead hand of the "Final Solution" even as its victims continued to hope. But he had one chance many did not have, and he took it. Charles Gelman fought back. Gelman was part of the Russian resistance; very few partisans survived to talk about their experiences. It was a difficult task for Gelman to find the desperate warriors hiding in the forests. Food had to be begged for; shelter was scarce; weapons were nearly impossible to come by and were a condition for joining the partisans.

Courage, ingenuity, and self-sacrifice were both shared and assumed in the underground. Gelman became part of an organized force and attacked German outposts, derailed trains, blew up bridges, ambushed tanks, and neutralized the occupation infrastructure. But most of all, Gelman gives us a participant's story of the armed resistance to Nazi genocide- and the story of those who did not go gentle. All proceeds donated to HRC in memory of Charles Gelman z'l.



(NOT) THE LAST WORD

MY REFLECTIONS OF MY FATHER, LEWIS L. GLICK, AFTER VIEWING **"BAGELS OVER BERLIN"**

I'm an "orphan;" my only sister Sandy died way too young; my dad died at age 84; and my mom died peacefully in her sleep a few years ago at age 95.

But attending the Buffalo International Jewish Film Festival screening of Alan Feinberg's **Bagels Over Berlin** with my Dad's military burial flag in hand and his dogtags around my neck was like spending the evening in my parents' living room reminiscing with my Dad's old war buddies who all told the same stories over and over again.

"The "Japs" bombing Pearl Harbor; all the young men, including the Jewish guys, rushing down to enlistment offices to join up; picking the Army Air Corp for many different reasons; finishing basic training, finishing flight training and shipping out to England to fight the Nazis. Praying every night that they flew out in the cover of darkness that they would be the ~50% of the planes and crews that returned in one piece; the losses of planes and lives was as great in the campaign to bomb Germany as any theater in WW2. The noise, the cold, the gore, the

shrapnel, and the fear they all felt in the non-pressurized B-24 "flying fortresses" trying to fly high enough to avoid antiaircraft munitions but low enough to have enough oxygen to function. Would they find their Allied fighter escorts before the German fighters or the antiaircraft guns found them? How long would it take to get in their 35 missions? If asked, would they fly more? If they played to their patriotism and said yes, the likelihood of making it home alive diminished arithmetically. And most importantly to the Jewish Army airmen, if they were shot down, what would the "H" (Hebrew) on their dog tags mean for them if captured by the Nazis; presumed torture and death!

The evening at the Amherst Theatre not only allowed me once more to reminisce about my father's life as a loyal family man dedicated to my mother, my sister and me, but to celebrate his pride as a patriotic American. My Dad's love for his country was second only to his love for my mother and his family. At the age of 25, shortly after WWII started, with a young wife who was pregnant with my sister, he enlisted in the Army Air Corps. During his training period, his inherent leadership abilities and his innate intelligence superseded the Army's requirements for enlisted men to have a college education to be an officer. Dad was selected, trained, and promoted to be a young Lieutenant Navigator in the Army Air Corps. He was assigned to a B-24 crew and sent to England with a group of other young "kids" to save the world from the despot of the day, Adolph Hitler.

It's probably easy to joke about now,

but who did this boy from California find as his commanding officer, but a Hollywood movie star, Jimmy Stewart? But this was not a movie. They were in for the fight of their lives and my Dad and his fellow boy-soldiers (for those who did come back) grew into men from this experience. Although no one talked about it back then, in retrospect many had PTSD; my Dad really enjoyed a good scotch every night "to sleep better". My Dad earned the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with 4 Oak Leaf Clusters, the American European Theater Ribbon, the Reinvasion of Europe Combat Award, and 4 Battle Stars for service to his country. As anyone who ever sat down and chatted with my Dad knew, this was a very powerful time of his life. Experiences during the war were embossed in his psyche and indelibly imprinted in his memory. All of the family members, friends and even acquaintances heard his stories dozens and dozens of times; Bagels over Berlin contained all of the same stories and facts.

In keeping with the title of this column, since Jews have the need to get in the last word, many thanks to Alan Feinberg for making this documentary happen. Also many thanks to Janet and Wayne Wisbaum for sponsoring the showing of **Bagels over Berlin** Buffalo International Jewish Film Festival and allowing me to have another special evening thinking about my Dad. With tears in my eyes I just want to say, "Dad you were a great role model. I wish you could see your great grandson, Lewis, named in your memory. We miss you and we love you and your memories!"


