Editor's **Note**

Toward the end of August, we began the Hebrew month of *Elul*, a time of reflection about our lives, about our souls, about ourselves, and about our community as we near the High Holy Days, which begin the next month of Tishri. This Elul, I am thinking about Jewish unity, Buffalo community unity, speaking out and fighting against hate.

You will note on our cover this month the beautiful faces of Buffalo children who experienced Jewish summer camp covering the spectrum of Jewish practice. We can see children from Camp Gan Israel (Orthodox), Camp George (Reform), Camp Ramah (Conservative), Camp Seneca Lake and Camp Centerland (non-denominational), and a few other camps. Each beautiful child is part of our Buffalo community, no matter what stream of Judaism-or none-they represent. And as a community, we cherish each one.

In the days since the march in Charlottesville, reaction to the overt racism and anti-Semitism has been loud and clear around the country and in our own community. You can see from a few photos taken at an interfaith rally held at the Durham AME Church in downtown Buffalo (page 50) on August 16 in which our Jewish community was well represented, both on the podium and in the crowd. The next day, August 17, Congregation Shir Shalom held an intimate gathering to talk about the Charlottesville rally. Holocaust Survivor and Holocaust Resource Center representative Sofia Veffer spoke at Shir Shalom. Of all the video footage and speakers I saw on television and on Facebook and Twitter, Sofia's words were the most chilling. She said she has seen this before, as a child, when she was hiding from the Nazis in Europe. She was able to flee Europe to be safe in the United States. Now this is happening here. What can we do about anti-Semitism and racism in the United States? What will we, as a local community and as the Jewish People, do about anti-Semitism and racism? Do you want to be part of our answer to Never Again? At Buffalo Jewish Federation, our Community Relations efforts have been ramping up, and at many local synagogues, interfaith outreach is happening all the time. Wisbaums to Receive Benderson Award at Federation Kick-Off Event

Janet and Wayne Wisbaum, passionate and committed lay leaders in Buffalo's Jewish Community for more than 40 years, will receive the prestigious Nathan Benderson Community Service Award at the Buffalo Jewish Federation's Campaign for Jewish Buffalo 2018 Kick-Off Community Event Monday, September 25th at the Hyatt Regency Buffalo. In announcing that the Wisbaums are this year's honorees, Buffalo Jewish Federation President Steven J. Weiss said that the award's presentation is very well deserved. The Nathan Benderson Community Leadership Award is given to "the person or persons whose extraordinary service and commitment to the Buffalo Jewish community exemplifies the leadership of Nathan Benderson."

Both Janet and Wayne have been involved and absorbed in many, many Jewish and general Buffalo community civic projects. When Janet and Wayne were honored by The State of Israel Bonds in 2001, they were described this way: "Without the work to which Wayne D. and Janet K. Wisbaum have dedicated their lives, Buffalo and Western New York would be a far poorer place to live. Through their advocacy and generous support of Jewish organizations, Israel, the arts, and philanthropic endeavors, the Wisbaums in a myriad of ways have helped to enrich their community."

Together, they received the Community Relations Award from the Buffalo Chapter of the AJC as well as the honor from Israel Bonds. They also together co-chaired one of the Federation's Campaign Kick-Off Dinner, and were honored by the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies in 2008 with its Legacies Award. Through funds they have established at the Foundation

for Jewish Philanthropies, the Wisbaums have channeled financial support to religious, educational, cultural and humanitarian causes locally, nationally and internationally.

Throughout their lives, they each have taken on leadership roles on the boards of numerous charities and continue to serve as role models for their active engagement in civic and communal affairs. Janet is a past chair of the Federation's Women's UJF Campaign and Federation's Community Relations Committee. She served on the Federation's board of Governors for many years. She also served on the boards of Jewish Family Service, AIDS Community Services, Family Planning Advocates of New York State, Buffalo Planned Parenthood, of which she was president as well as a national board member. Currently, she sits on the board of Planned Parenthood of Western & Central New York, the Women's TAP Fund, and Weinberg Campus. Janet is a

recipient of the Award in Volunteer Service for the NFJC, The Women's Health Award from Planned Parenthood of Buffalo & Erie County, and the Jewish Welfare Board's (predecessor of the JCC Assn.) New Leadership Award. She will be honored October 4th by Planned Parenthood with its Lifetime Achievement Award.

Past Federation president Howard Rosenhoch recently profiled Wayne Wisbaum for the February 2017 "Difference Makers" issue of *The Jewish Journal*. Here is part of his story about Wayne:

"Wayne Wisbaum is a Harvard-educated lawyer who has practiced his profession in Buffalo for more than 55 years as a partner at Kavinoky Cook. Wayne's legal career has formed the platform for his years of community service. Emblematic of Wayne's selfless contributions, in 2003 the New York State Bar Association presented him with the coveted Root Stimson Award, recognizing his outstanding commitment to community and volunteer service and to the improvement of the justice system.

He was President of the Buffalo Council on World Affairs only 8 years after starting his private law practice. The number and breadth of community organizations that have benefited from Wayne's leadership-- as chair, officer and/or board member – have been legion, including American Jewish Committee – Buffalo Chapter, Jewish Family Service, Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra, Artpark, Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies, Burchfield Penney Art Center, Zoological Society of Buffalo, Buffalo State College Foundation, Temple Beth Zion, United Way and Catholic Charities Fund Drives, Buffalo and Erie County Public Libraries, Irish Classical Theatre Company, Buffalo Jewish Federation and Daemen College.

The many honors and awards conferred on Wayne in recognition of his community service stand as a testament

to his contributions. In addition to the Root Stimson Award, they include the Young Leadership Award of the United Jewish Federation of Greater Buffalo, the Abram Pugash Award from Jewish Family Service, the Buffalo News Outstanding Citizen of the Year Award, the Buffalo History Museum's Red Jacket Award, the Friends of Wildlife Award from the Buffalo Zoo, the National Endowment Achievement Award from the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies and, just this past year, the Inaugural Grosvenor Award from the Buffalo and Erie County Public Libraries. Among the many honors Wayne has received, two touched his heart most of all - the Community Relations Award of the American Jewish Committee and the Outstanding Community Leader Citation from the State of Israel Bonds. That's because Wayne shared those awards with Janet, the woman with whom he fell in love at first sight, his partner in life, and his wife of 57 years.

When Wayne served as president of the BPO in the early to mid-1980's, and then chaired Kleinhans Music Hall Management and its \$12 million restoration campaign throughout the 1990's, both the Orchestra and its home faced financial crises which Wayne managed and overcame. In the late 1980's, Wayne undertook to chair the Soviet Jewry Resettlement Committee, a joint committee of Jewish Family Service and the Buffalo Jewish Federation. Wayne and Janet led a 200 person Buffalo delegation, joining over 200,000 who marched on Washington in support of freedom of emigration for Soviet Jews."

Prof. Alex Green Interviews Rabbi Jonathan Sacks

Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks, former Chief Rabbi of the United Hebrew Congregations of the British Commonwealth, was at the Chautauqua Institution this past July to give a morning lecture during a week which explores "a crisis of faith." The Institution reached out to the Buffalo Jewish Federation for an interview with Rabbi Sacks. Dr. Alex Green of the UB Department of Jewish Thought conducted the interview with the man who was acquainted with his parents. Karen Green assisted with the interview.

An international religious leader, philosopher, award-winning author and respected moral voice, Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks served as Chief Rabbi of the United Hebrew Congregations of the (British) Commonwealth for 22 years, from 1991 to 2013. Since 2013, he has held a number of professorships at several academic institutions, including Yeshiva University and Kings College London. He currently serves as a Distinguished Professor at New York University. Sacks is the author of more than 30 books, including his most recent, Not in God's Name, which was awarded a 2015 National Jewish Book Award. Sacks is the recipient of numerous awards, including the Jerusalem Prize in 1995 for his contribution to diaspora Jewish life. He was knighted by Her Majesty The Queen in 2005, and made a Life Peer, taking his seat in the House of Lords in 2009.

AG: In your newly acclaimed book, Not in God's Name, you suggest that the justifications of violence from religious texts are a misreading and abuse of our holy scriptures. You argue that "the use of religion for political ends is not righteousness, but idolatry." In America, Israel and around

the world, we have seen religion used for purposes of exclusion and often violence. How can Judaism, Christianity and Islam be a force for good in a liberal and diverse society, or does openness and tolerance require banishing religion from the public sphere?

JS: My view is that all three faiths have both hard texts and histories of violence with peoples of other faiths. often histories of violence towards members of their own faith whether dissident or schismatic. Faiths are learning organizations and they do this through successive interpretations of their own texts. I have tried to show in the book how they did so, how Judaism rewrote its texts after the catastrophe of the first century and Christianity did so in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries after the catastrophe of the wars of religion. Clearly Islam will have to do so in the twenty first century. The thing that really makes religions wake up to the danger and harm to their own faith is when there is conflict within the faith itself. When you are killing your enemies, you can say this is God's work. But when you are killing your



own, it becomes much harder. I think that is the basic and major challenge facing all the faiths in the twenty-first century. Most people at most times have been surrounded by people who are like them. Today we are in a world of inescapable interconnectedness with people who are very unlike us and it seems to me that is God's challenge to us in the twenty-first century. If Jews, Christians and Muslims can put their historic animosities behind them, it can be seen in the full retrospect of history to answer the challenge of today.

AG: You have been Chief Rabbi of the United Kingdom from 1991-2013 and have recently been teaching at New York University as the Ingeborg and Ira Rennert Global Distinguished Professor of Judaic Thought. Having spent more time in America recently after having finished your tenure as Chief Rabbi, what do you like about America and American Jewish life?

IS: American Jewish life has two things that are really remarkable. First, it has critical mass. It can do things on a scale that we can't do anywhere else in the diaspora. There is nothing quite like AIPAC, there is nothing quite like the General Assembly, there is nothing like the number of Jewish students at universities like NYU, University of Pennsylvania or SUNY. You go to one university in the States and there are more Jewish students than all the universities in the UK! That critical mass makes a huge difference. Second, it's very decentralized, which creates creativeness. Sometimes it looks a little chaotic to a guy from Britain, but it's creative chaos. I thought chaos theory was a description of the Jewish people!

AG: You have been involved in communal leadership for the last 30 years. What advice do you have for those considering taking on positions of leadership? How can Jews and Judaism uniquely contribute to diverse communities like Buffalo?

IS: It's hard to be Jewish, so if you can do that, you can handle any challenge life throws at you. We say "the Lord is my Shepherd" but no Jew is ever a sheep! It's difficult. It's really challenging. It's thrilling. We are great at leadership. We are terrible at followership. And that makes it very challenging. You are tested in the Jewish community. That is enormous source of strength if you can come through it. Of course, in order to come through it you need: one, a very supportive family. Two, you've got to have wise friends who will say to you the most important word in any language, "no." You need to have people who will stop you from making the big mistakes. And then the people who believe in you who will take you through the difficult moments. I was always blessed to have two or three people who always believed in me more than I believed in myself. That helped me through the difficult time. There will be difficult times, whoever you are, whatever your leadership position. Also, a good sense of humor. Make sure you stay faithful to your ideals. Make sure you have good friends.

AG: In Buffalo, we have a program called Nickel City Jews, which is a community platform for bringing together the people and events that make up Jewish Life in Buffalo for young adults in their 20s, 30s and early 40s. Nickel City Jews' mission is to create ongoing and varied programs that facilitate engagement of Jewish young adults



with each other and with Jewish experiences. It has been very successful! What advice do you have engaging Millennials to be proud of their Iewish identity?

JS: Wow, big question! I think the twenty-first century is going to throw Millennials a lot of challenges. I don't mean specifically Jewish millennials or specifically Jewish challenges. I think we are heading to a period of great instability in every level of life. Jews are the world's experts in surviving instability and doing so while thriving personally and collectively and experiencing joy while so doing. Jews have this written into their DNA. I would make the whole world Jewish. It's the best thing for the universe. Look at what this lady from Silicon Valley said to me. Rabbi Sacks: the smartphones and tablets are doing terrible things for our kids. They are degrading their social skills, their attention spans, their ability to make eye contact. When we have family meals, they have their phone under the table and they are texting their friends. It was bad for them and bad for the family. You'll love what we decided to do: we decided to take one day a week and make it a screen-free day, no smartphones, no tablets. We've called it Shabbat. That is one more instance of when I tell non-lews what lews do to keep their values intact in an age of turbulent change, the non-Jews love it. One of the most powerful devices is Shabbat itself. It's terrific for family, community and for giving gratitude.

AG: Over the last few years, we have seen the resurgence of anti-Semitism. You spoke powerfully on this topic at the The Future of the Jewish Communities in Europe Conference at The European Parliament on September 27, 2016 in Brussels. What is anti-Semitism and where does it come from? How do we explain its persistence and mutation? What advice do you have to combat anti-Semitism?

JS: Anti-Semitism is a phenomenon of cognitive dissonance, when the way the world is, is just not the way you expected it to be. This happens when people feel left behind by the pace of events, the way Germany did after the first world war with the Treaty of Versailles and then hyperinflation. The mass of people feel that history has been unfair to them and the history that is not the way it ought to be. As I explain in my YouTube video "The Mutation of Anti-Semitism," there are two questions any culture can ask: either "what did we do wrong?" or

"who did this to us?" Whenever a culture asks the second question "who did this to us?" it looks for someone to blame. Usually Jews were the most convenient people to blame because a) they were around, b) there were enough of them to be a threat and they weren't going to retaliate if you blame them and c) there has been a pretty long tradition written into Christian and Muslim texts from the beginning. That's what anti-Semitism is. What you do about it, certainly in Europe. The first thing you need to do is to stop defining it as a Jewish problem. I always say is that the hate that begins with Jews never ends with Jews. The only way to defeat anti-Semitism is to get the public to realize that it's aimed at all of us. Britain was the first country, where we insisted on principle, that the fight against anti-Semitism is led by non-Jews. This was extremely well lead by the four prime ministers that I had the privilege of working with: John Major, Gordon Brown, Tony Blair and David Cameron.

AG: The recent decision in the Knesset to cancel the agreed upon compromise to negotiate and rebuild the egalitarian section of the Western Wall at Robinson's Arch has caused tension between Israeli and Diaspora Jewish leaders. What do you see as the proper role for the Kotel? How can Israelis and Diaspora Jews learn from each other?

JS: I sat with Natan Sharansky about four years ago and we solved the problem in two minutes. The problem is not the solution. The solution has been there for years. The problem is nobody wants the solution, they want the argument! You know Jews love arguing. If we keep talking to one another, we'll get closer to one another. There is a place in the Kotel for everyone. The solution was there from day one. There is a solution that is good for everyone. But first we need to make space in our hearts in a way that draws people together and not drives them apart.

Alexander Green is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Jewish Thought at the State University at Buffalo, and is director of Undergraduate Studies for the Department. He completed his Ph.D. at the University of Toronto in the Department for the Study of Religion and his MA in Jewish Thought at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. His research focuses on medieval Jewish philosophy, ethics, and the history of biblical interpretation. His first book is The Virtue Ethics of Levi Gersonides.

High Holy Days @ Hillel



A Father-Son Collaboration: Sull Family Brings Buffalo Jewish Review into The Digital Age

Since its founding in 1918, the Buffalo Jewish Review has been covering Jewish life in Western New York. Over the decades, the weekly newspaper has reached generations of readers. For most of its history, the publication was owned by local Jewish families, notably the Jacobs family from 1921 to 1971, and the Weiss family from 1971 to 2015. Today, it is edited and published by the Sull family; Father Nathan Sull is the publisher with his son, Aaron Sull, who is editor-in-chief. Nathan's brother, Kenneth Sull, is a consultant for the publication.

The Sulls acquired the paper from Micaela Ben Abraham in October 2016. Ben Abraham purchased it from the Weiss family in 2015. While the outlet was always more about capturing Buffalo Jewish life than generating profits, its print-based business model was becoming unsustainable. "As one can imagine, the

cost of printing a paper for a small base of subscribers wasn't there," explains publisher Nathan Sull. "We could either die or continue. [Our] passion keeps it alive. My career as a Registered Nurse translates into being a publisher as it's about assessing lives and stories. I want to bring passion to this [publishing] business. This is the story of our Jewish community," he adds. In addition to donating the paper's back-issues to the local archives, the Sulls have chosen to reinvent the publication online for today's digital age.

The Sull family came to Buffalo in the 1950s. Nathan has many

warm memories growing up in North Buffalo, then home to many synagogues, kosher butchers, and establishments **Iewish** along Hertel Avenue. The family is eager to celebrate the community's past with an eye to documenting its current vibrancy, including its local synagogues, schools, and community organizations.

Led by Editor-In-Chief Aaron Sull, a Buffalo native who now resides with his wife and children in Israel. the Buffalo Jewish Review launched its website, **buffireview.com**, in March 2017. The Sulls encourage the community to visit the website and sign up for its weekly emails.

"We're not losing a paper. We are becoming more timely, especially regarding events," says editor Aaron Sull. "It's a new adventure. There is so much potential to represent a one-stop shop for all of this." In particular, the Sulls are proud of how the publication's "Dearly Beloved" section provides more timely information regarding the passing, funeral, and shiva details of the recently deceased. It also features insights on the weekly parsha (Torah portion) from Buffalo rabbis from across the denominational spectrum.

The Sulls are now uploading previous issues to its online archive and reaching out to local organizations to help the Buffalo Jewish Review's readership. They are grateful to their board of directors, whose monetary support has made the digital migration possible, as well as those who are visiting the website and signing up for its emails.

Relationships Renewed

I was informed by Facebook, that in the month of July I made 100 new friends. Thank you Facebook! I am certain that if I include new people that I only met in-person this summer, but have not yet connected with over social media, I have made at least another 100 connections. And what is unique about this group is that they all live here in Buffalo!



The Rich Family

The rate at which I have met new people underscores what is special about Buffalo. I'm new to town and moved this summer with my husband. Ezra, and our two young daughters, Miriam and Sivan to begin my new position as Executive Director of Hillel of Buffalo. As we start this exciting new chapter in our lives, we have been deeply touched by the warm reception and extension of friendship that we have received here, and we are honored to be a part of this community. If we are not friends yet, either online or in person, then I hope we will have an opportunity to meet very soon.

Before moving to the Nickel City, I served as the Director of Education at the Hillel of Princeton University, where I taught extracurricular classes, offered pastoral care, and supported students in leadership development and community-building initiatives. It is through the formation of relationships with students, and among students, that these initiatives were successful. I am thrilled to have the opportunity to expand the capacity of the Hillel of Buffalo into a hub for building relationships between students and with the greater Buffalo Jewish community.

It is during this time of preparation for the High Holy Days that we direct special attention to our own relationships. We take stock of our actions from the past year and seek to identify the people whom we have wronged. The medieval philosopher and commentator Rabbi Moses Maimonides teaches in his Laws of

Repentance (2:9) that the atonement that we seek during this time of repentance is only attainable if we reach out directly to those whom we have hurt. The approach is two-pronged: one must make restitution for any physical damage, such as theft or injury, and one must ask for forgiveness. Until both are completed, atonement has not taken place. It is therefore the responsibility of the injured party to receive repayment, and to accept the apology, so that the wrongdoer can move forward. God cannot grant forgiveness on behalf of a person - this exchange must take place directly between the two people.

We learn from this teaching that relationships are primary, and must be treated with the highest of care. Nurturing a relationship is so sacred a task between people that even God cannot intercede. Repairing a relationship takes humility and a willingness to listen. By rebuilding our connections with others, we open up new possibilities for sharing experiences, lending and receiving support, and expanding community to others.

This year, Hillel of Buffalo seeks to build hundreds of new relationships in our community. We aim to facilitate relationships between freshmen in a dedicated Jewish learning cohort; we plan to send a group of 40 students to Israel on Birthright this winter, where relationships will be forged while walking the Old City of Jerusalem and floating in the Dead Sea. We are seeking opportunities to partner more with the University at Buffalo and its graduate programs, and to create new relationships with Buffalo State and other colleges in the area. We want to build bridges between the campus and the greater community; we desire to be in closer relationship with the Buffalo Jewish community, which will open up a world of possibilities for UB"s Jewish students through community service, mentorship, and joint learning ventures.

I am personally looking to build new relationships with anyone with a connection to Jewish student life in Buffalo. If you know incoming students, family members of current students or alumni, I would be delighted to meet them and help connect them to our efforts. 

PJ Library Survey: WOW



The Harold Grinspoon Foundation (HGF) recently released the results from the 2016 Triennial PJ Library Family Study. HGF first launched PJ Library in 2005 to distribute free, high-quality Jewish children's books every month to families with children ages 6 months through 5 years old. Buffalo became a PJ community in 2014. While the program began just in the US and Canada, it has expanded to 12 countries around the world and offers books for children now through age 8, plus through the PJ Our Way program, providing books for older children through age 12 to select cities, including Buffalo.

In our community, we had over 60 individuals respond to this survey, nearly a 25% response rate (higher than other communities). Below are some interesting facts to note about our Buffalo PJ Library community.

Close to 40% of our respondents identify as intermarried (just one parent identifies as Jewish), slightly higher than our counterparts in other similar size communities as well as those across the US and Canada. Interestingly, every single one of them reports that PJ Library has increased their confidence to engage with their children regarding Jewish traditions, values and/or customs.

Nearly 25% of our respondents fall on the low end of the spectrum of Jewish engagement (over 10% higher than others across the US and Canada), meaning that PJ Library is even more important in Buffalo for our families.

Just over 80% of our respondents know that the Buffalo Jewish Federation is the local community partner (almost double that of other respondents) and 65% of these individuals have interacted with us in the last year (also nearly double that of other respondents).

Of the respondents that attended one of our programs in the last year, over 80% of them report that they connected socially with other adults during the event (over 10% higher than other respondents across the US and Canada). Therefore, it is critical that we not only maintain but continue to improve upon the varied calendar of events that we offer for families and parents throughout the year as these in-person connections are crucial and very meaningful.

Along these lines, we offered not only our first summertime Tot Shabbat, but our first Tot Shabbat in the city, this summer at Temple Beth Zion on Delaware Ave. We had a great crowd and received a lot of positive comments from families who were new to a PJ Library program. We also hosted another program downtown, the first-ever Summer Shabbat Storytime at the Elmwood-Bidwell Farmers Market. We are also in the process of finalizing a great calendar of PJ Library events for the coming year...stay tuned!





Renewing the Shir Shalom Library

It upset Congregation Shir Shalom (CSS) congregant Robin Raphael to see books tucked away at her synagogue where they couldn't be displayed or read. At the same time, CSS congregant Rella Corris felt that Congregation Shir Shalom had the material for a quality library, but lacked the volunteers to make it happen. That's why Ms. Raphael and Ms. Corris, for the past two or three years, have been volunteering two hours a week to sort, catalog and organize hundreds of books with Jewish themes.

Now, they want their fellow congregants and the larger community to know that a quality library is quietly being put in place at Shir Shalom. "It's fascinating to find out what books we have here," Ms. Corris said. "The hope is to get people using them

When Temple Sinai and Temple Beth Am merged five years ago, the library took a back seat to other issues. The former Beth Am – which now houses Shir Shalom — had little order to its library and even fewer users. Worse yet, Sinai packed its library books in boxes, where they remained untouched. "They sat in the closet for two years," Ms. Raphael said. "I couldn't stand it. We were determined to find good homes for the books."

Ms. Raphael, a retired school psychologist, started the library renewal by poring through the previously unopened boxes to determine which books should be cataloged and kept, and which should be donated or disposed of due to poor condition or lack of space. When Ms. Corris realized what a monumental task Ms. Raphael had launched, she offered her assistance. "I always volunteer here," said Ms. Corris, a member of the Shir Shalom Board of Trustees. "We are very pleased with how we've progressed."

The library, now in the final stages of completion, has more than 50 books on the Holocaust; works donated by the family of Susan Wehle, the cantor who was killed in a 2009 plane crash; and books autographed by Moshe Dayan, the Israeli military leader and politician, and by Mordecai Kaplan, the founder of the

Reconstructionist branch of Judaism.

Hundreds of other titles were donated to a book sale organized by the UB branch of the American Association of University Women, the Jewish Studies Department at UB and to a professor of religion at Canisius College. More than 100 books were left on a table in the Shir Shalom lobby and given to interested congregants.

Shir Shalom Rabbi Alexander Lazarus-Klein said consolidating libraries is "one of the toughest tasks" of merged congregations. "Libraries are so integral to temple life," he said. "We are, after all, the People of the Book. Robin and Rella have tackled this head on."

Now that the adult library is nearing completion, Ms. Raphael and Ms. Corris plan to reorganize the youth library down the hall. "I like to be useful," Ms. Raphael said of her willingness to revamp both libraries. "I like to learn. It's all good."

Ohr Tzion Plans Art Auction

Kehillat Ohr Tzion (KOT) will be holding an art auction Sunday, September 10 at 7:00 pm. The silent auction will feature beautiful signed and numbered lithographs of micro-calligraphy by two Israeli artists from Safed.

Micro-calligraphy is an ancient art form which creates images using very tiny Hebrew letters from biblical passages or prayers. This art form began in the 10th century in both Egypt and the land of Israel. Hebrew micrography was the creation of Masorah scribes in Tiberias as book forms of the Tanach were produced. often taking years to create each work of art. From the 13th to the 15th centuries many Sephardic scribes created beautiful Haggadot in Catalonia.

This art form became popularized in Israel after the 1948 War of Independence. Today. in Safed there are a few excellent artists who have revived this ancient art form and recreate entire books of the bible into scenes using micro-calligraphy.

The KOT art auction will include the signed and numbered lithographs of two of these artists. At the auction there will be two different representations of the Book of Ruth



created by different artists. The other lithographs are titled 'Shabbat', "Havdallah', 'Ecclesiastes', 'The Ten Commandments' and 'Esther'.

The silent art auction at Kehillat Ohr Tzion (879 Hopkins Rd) will take place on Sunday, September 10 at 7:00 PM. There will be drinks and a dessert bar. HADASSAH HAPPENINGS



2017 Buffalo Maccabi Team brings home Gold, Silver and Bronze

The JCC Maccabi Games® are an Olympic-style sporting competition held each summer in North America and is the second largest organized sports program for Jewish teenagers in the world. The first North American JCC Maccabi Games® were held in 1982 with 300 athletes. Due to overwhelming interest, Regional Games were added in 1985 to augment the even-year Continental Games. 1997 marked the first time that the Games were held simultaneously in six American cities with 4,400 participating athletes. Since their inception in 1982, the Games have grown from a small pilot project in one host community to an Olympic-style sporting competition held each summer in multiple sites throughout North America.

Today, over 6,000 teens, ranging from 13 to 16 years of age, participate in the JCC Maccabi Games® each summer. The Games are co-sponsored by the Jewish Community Center Association of North America, Maccabi World Union, Maccabi Canada, and Maccabi USA/Sports for Israel.

I have been the delegation head since 1996 when Buffalo first participated in the games. I saw this as an opportunity to engage our Jewish teens into an invaluable program which combined athletic competition with Jewish values while fostering the Jewish identity in an informal setting. Teens had the chance to meet other Jewish teens from across the United States, Canada and international countries. I had made the commitment then to help foster the Buffalo program and took ownership to insure that we participated whenever we could.

Over the years I have worked with many incredible coaches, met wonderful families and athletes and have taken part in Maccabi Games throughout the country. I have always said how proud I was of our teams; the spirit of competition, their heart and desire to represent their community in the Games. Host communities love to house our kids because they know they are kind, polite and appreciate everything these families do for



HEBREW HIGH STUDENT, MICHAEL SANDERS, WINS INTERNATIONAL PHOTOGRAPHY COMPETITION







Camhi holds a B.A. in English from Marietta College, Marietta, Ohio, and a M.L.S. from UB. "My first attempts at art were drawing and coloring clothes for my paper dolls when I was little. Over the years, my doodling helped me through many a boring class! Fortunately, I was required to take college courses in art appreciation and that began a genuine interest in fine art. When my daughter decided to major in art, her interest drew me into many a museum and gallery, deepening my appreciation. I have maintained this passion for art through years of travel that allowed me to see some of the great masterpieces in New York City, Athens, Paris, Rome, London, Madrid, Cairo, Dublin, Tel Aviv, and Jerusalem. As a retiree, I am finally taking my first art classes and finding a renewed love of art," says Camhi.

This Rosh Hashanah, Reach Out To College Students Challenged By "Freshman Blues"

At once solemn and joyous, the sentience and ceremony of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur focus on reflection and definition of individual and spiritually viable response to life itself. "As we approach the Jewish New Year, we need to focus on why our lives matter, as an urgent wake-up call to our responsibility to live a life filled with meaning and purpose," Rabbi Benjamin Blech counsels at www.aish.com

The celebrations of the Jewish New Year and Day of Atonement come at the time of year when many new college students are struggling to find meaning and purpose in their newly adult lives. Pangs of homesickness; and pressure to manage the demands of attending classes and completing coursework with getting to the cafeteria before it closes, connecting to new friends and sharing close quarters with relative strangers, may lead to what has become known as "Freshman Blues."

When the emotional transition to college becomes more than just temporary sadness or anxiety, young adults sometimes develop serious mental health challenges, such as clinical depression, that requires professional help.

"Being away from home for the first time can be especially overwhelming during meaningful holiday time of family and friends. JFS encourages all in our community to consider the teachings and traditions associated with Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur within the context of college students struggling to meet the challenges of their freshman year," says Marlene Schillinger, president and CEO of Jewish Family Service of Buffalo & Erie County.

Take a little extra time to connect with your own children, or with young family members and friends who are away from their communities from the first time. Remind them that in our Jewish tradition, every person is charged with a unique purpose and that while they may find it difficult at the moment to find a comfortable space to fit in, their life purpose is as individual as their fingerprint, and that finding and fulfilling that purpose is the heart of life's journey."



Schillinger also encourages students, parents and the general community to "Join the Conversation" at www.letstalkstigma. org. Administered by the Erie County Anti-Stigma Coalition, of which JFS is a founder, the website is part of a multimedia campaign to help reduce discrimination that keeps people from reaching out for help for a mental health disorder.

Jewish Family Service of Buffalo & Erie County provides mental health diagnosis and treatment for adults, seniors, children and teens at its outpatient clinic at 70 Barker Street, Buffalo, NY 14209. Compassionate JFS therapists have experience in treating anxiety and depression, bipolar disorder, PTSD, schizophrenia, eating disorders, problem gambling and a wide range of other mental and behavioral health disorders.

"We want people to know that mental health challenges impact many lives, that stereotypes are prevalent and need to change, and that you are not alone and recovery is possible," Schillinger says. "In the broadest picture, we urge everyone to take the antistigma pledge at www.letstalkstigma.org and encourage anyone who thinks they or someone they love may be experiencing a mental health challenge to call us at 883-1914. Help is available and we can help."


ONE WALL FOR ONE PEOPLE

My wife Drucy and I have just returned from an amazing 8 day personal tour of Israel led by native Buffalonian Yonit Schiller, daughter of David and Beverly Schiller; for each of us it had been more than 40 years since our last visit. We had a 4 sea experience (Mediterranean, Dead, Galilee, and Red). We went from the Kinneret, to the Golan, to Eilat (and Petra), Tel Aviv and Jerusalem. The people were wonderful. The food amazing. And our quide oozed expertise and Israeli pride! We felt quite at "home" during our trip.

While in Jerusalem, we of course went to the Kotel. In the main area, it was quite busy and beautiful to see the spirituality, whether individuals in private prayer or families celebrating simchahs. Disappointedly but expected, the women had their own section, but the family simchahs were on the men only side; a bitter pill for many of us who believe in total equality for (Jewish) women. The women were hanging over the separation wall to participate in the family events!

Yonit offered us to pray at the Kotel separately and we declined. Drucy and I are proud Reform Jews and live our lives together as equals in every aspect of our marriage including religious, secular, professional and personal roles. Yonit then took us down some stairs, through a separate security gate and into a very

secluded area at the southern expanse of the Kotel called "the egalitarian section" which allowed Drucy and I to have a meaningful visit to the Kotel and pray together. Amazingly, we had this beautiful area to ourselves!

This area was created in January of 2016 by an Israeli government agreement, in a cabinet vote of 15 in favor and 5 against, after years of negotiations, that would allow non-orthodox men and women Jews to pray together at the Kotel. This agreement specifically allowed women to lead services, read Torah, sing aloud and wear tefillin and tallit. At the time of the affirmative vote, it was hailed as "historic," "groundbreaking," and "one wall for one people." At the time of our

early June 2017 visit, full implementation of this agreement, the fine print, had yet to be fully executed, but the site was fully functional.

Just weeks later on June 25, 2017, multiple Israel and American news sites reported "Israeli cabinet 'freezes' plan to create egalitarian prayer space at the Western Wall!" Drucy and I felt disappointed and betrayed. Our impression, during and after our visit to our religious homeland, was that Israel was on a more pluralistic path for non-Orthodox Jews and their rights to religious freedom. We were not alone. For example, Avigdor Lieberman, the defense minister and leader of the secular Yisrael Beiteinu party said, "today's cancellation of the decision is a severe blow to the unity of the Jewish people, the Jewish communities and the fabric of the relationship between the state of Israel and the Jews in the Diaspora." A plethora of American Jewish leaders immediately jumped on planes to personally lobby Netanyahu to reverse the freeze to derail the plan to create an egalitarian prayer space at the Kotel. As of now, there is no resolution to this internecine dispute.

Israel is an amazing country; we are already talking about a return visit. As Jews we need to support Israel as an existential homeland for the Iewish people, but they still have some work to do treating men and women equally! I hope this happens soon.


