

Yom HaShoah-Memories of Courage

The Holocaust Resource Center of Buffalo's Yom HaShoah Commemoration will pay tribute to the Liberators and Righteous among the Nations who stood up to save the Jews during the Holocaust. The commemoration will be held Sunday April 15 at 10:30 a.m. at Temple Beth Tzedek, 621 Getzville Road in Amherst.

Six individuals will be lighting one candle each in memory of the Six Million Jews killed in the Shoah (Holocaust). The six individuals being honored included Stephan Lewy (Survivor and Liberator), Kurt Klein (Liberator), Tibor Baranski (Righteous among the Nations), Raoul Wallenberg (Righteous among the Nations), Oskar Schindler (Righteous among the Nations) and Aleksandra Drzewecka (Righteous among the Nations). Honorable Penny M. Wolfgang and Drew Kahn will narrate the biographies of the honorees.

Following on the theme of memory, The Buffalo News staff that created the 2017 special newspaper insert, Survivors of the Holocaust, will also be honored

and will give a brief presentation on how the project was created and its impact. The Buffalo News honorees include Cathaleen Curtiss, director of photography; Mark Mulville, photographer; Mark Sommer, reporter; and Gene Warner, reporter.

Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra Cellist Robert Hausmann will be preforming two pieces as part of the commemoration. One will be "Kaddish" by Composer Maurice Ravel. Mr. Hausmann performed this on a recent BPO trip to Poland at Auschwitz-Birkenau in memory of his great-grandmother who was killed there.

"The perpetrators of the Shoah systemically murdered 6 million Jews including 1.5 million children. This day is dedicated to remembering their legacy, the resilience of the survivors and gratitude to Liberators and the Righteous among the Nations." said Rachel Kranitz McPhee, Esq., Executive Vice President of the Holocaust Resource Center of Buffalo.

Leslie Shuman Kramer is national Kipnis-Wilson/Friedland Award Winner

The Buffalo Jewish Federation will honor Leslie Shuman Kramer as a 2018 Kipnis-Wilson/Friedland Award Winner of National Women's Philanthropy of the Jewish Federations of North America. This distinction, named for Lion of Judah founders Norma Kipnis-Wilson and Toby Friedland z"l, honors the most inspiring women in our North American communities and will be awarded at the International Lion of Judah Conference in Miami next January.

"I am honored to be receiving this beautiful award," said Mrs. Kramer. "I know I share it with many other deserving women, for whom I have so much respect. I feel blessed to be able to spend much of my time involved in the Jewish world, for which I have always had a passion."

Leslie Shuman Kramer is currently Vice President of the Buffalo Iewish Federation and is a member of Iewish Federation of North America's National Women's Philanthropy Board, where she holds the portfolio of Vice Chair of Community Engagement. She chaired the 2016 and 2015 Campaigns for Jewish Buffalo, the 2010 and 2009 UJF Women's Philanthropy Campaign, and has been a longtime member of Buffalo Jewish Federation's Campaign Cabinet, where she co-chaired a number of divisions, including Lion of Iudah.

At the Buffalo Jewish Federation, in addition to serving as Vice President, she has been a member of the Board of Governors since 2006, and sits on the Federation's Executive Committee, chaired the Federation's recent Education Task Force and was a member of the Federation Community Strategic Planning Task Force.

Over the years, her interest in Education was expressed by serving as President of the Buffalo Bureau of Iewish Education, a volunteer for the Buffalo Iewish Coalition for Literacy, a volunteer at Buffalo's Vive La Casa, and a member of the Amherst Central School District Board of Education from 2010-2013. She also previously served as a board member of Temple Beth Tzedek as Education Co-chair.

Having visited and lived in Israel as a youth and young adult, Leslie has continued to visit Israel frequently. Along with her husband Jim, Shira and Rob Goldberg and Ellen and Steven Weiss, she co-chaired Buffalo's 2012 New Leadership

Mission to Israel and has co-chaired the NWP Heart to Heart Mission. She participated in Buffalo's 2008 Menorah Mission, and has visited Poland, Tbilisi

Georgia, and Israel on several national missions including JFNA Campaign Chair and Directors Missions and NWP's Machar Mission. She is currently co-chairing the Buffalo Israel Experience which will bring a group of nearly 80 people to Israel in October.

Leslie has co-chaired Federation's Leadership Development program and the Leadership Power program for Women and has served on the Community Relations Committee.

An attorney, Mrs. Kramer practiced law in Chicago and Buffalo. While in Chicago she was a member of the Chicago Federation Young Leadership Board.

Mrs. Kramer graduated from Cornell University, spending her Junior year at Tel Aviv University, and the University of Buffalo Law School. She was the 2000 Ruth and Milton Kahn Young Leadership Award winner. Mrs. Kramer and her husband Jim have three children and lives in Amherst.

Rabbi Alex Lazarus-Klein

Thursday is one of my favorite days of the week, because every Thursday morning, I get to spend time with a group of women from Weinberg Campus, where we gather in the game room to study Torah and talk about life. One of the members of this illustrious group is Ruth Merlin, who regales us with stories of her life in Israel, pre-1948. She was born in Tel Aviv, just a decade or so after the city was founded. It was at a time when Meir Dizengoff still rode on his horse down the newly-formed streets of the city and where a State of Israel was still just a pipe dream.

In those days, Dizengoff's house was at the center of town on Rothschild Boulevard. When his wife died in 1930, Dizengoff transformed their house into an art museum where paintings by Chagall and other Jewish artists lined the walls. But, it was not until 1948 that his house took on a new level of importance. On Friday, May 14 of that year, just before sundown, a group of Zionist leaders filled the small building. The event was supposed to be a secret, but word quickly got out that something important was about to happen. The next day, British troops would be leaving Palestine, and all the Jews living there at the time would suddenly be vulnerable to attack.

Instead of living in fear, David Ben Gurion and the others gathered that day to announce to the world their intentions. Ben Gurion's voice boomed into the microphone as he read the Declaration of Independence in just seventeen minutes time:

"ERETZ-ISRAEL (the Land of Israel) was the birthplace of the Jewish people," Ben Gurion began, in a transmission that went out to the world via the radio. Continuing a few minutes later, "accordingly we, the People's Council, representatives of the Jewish Community of Eretz-Israel... hereby declare the establishment of a Jewish State in Eretz-Israel, to be known as the State of Israel."

This past December I had a chance to visit Independence Hall during the Interfaith Clergy trip sponsored by our Buffalo Jewish Federation to hear Ben Gurion's words in the exact space he gave his address. The building itself is now lost among the immense buildings of modern Tel Aviv. What was barely a sand dune when Ruth Merlin was a child is now one of the top tourist destinations in the world.

On Thursday, April 19th we will celebrate the 70th anniversary of the Hebrew date of that important gathering. Seventy in the Talmud is the age of "gray hairs," so I guess that means we have finally arrived. The Jewish community will be having a number of important events that day starting with a 4 PM gathering at Niagara Square to publicly declare our love of the State of Israel and then it's time to party at Acqua later that evening. We will also be showing the movie Exodus that Monday at the North Park Theater at 7 PM. Hope to see you at any or all of the events.

Chocolate Sabra Cake Perfect for Pesach!

April is a busy month with both Passover and Yom Ha'atzmaut....Here's a birthday cake that fits the bill to celebrate Passover as well as Israel's 70th birthday.



Chocolate Sabra Cake

1/2c almond meal 1/2 c matzo cake meal 2 lbs. semi sweet chocolate chips 12 Tbsp. butter or margarine 3 eggs

1 ½ c sugar

1/4 c Sabra liqueur (Sabra liqueur is an orange chocolate liqueur made in Israel, and can be found in local liquor stores.)

2 Tbsp. grated orange peel

Preheat oven to 350°.

Grease (2) 9" cake pans.

Combine butter or margarine and chocolate chips in microwave safe bowl and heat until chocolate is melted. Cool. Beat eggs for 1 minute. Add sugar and Sabra. Beat until thick and yellow—5 minutes. Gently fold in chocolate mixture and orange peel and then stir in almond meal and cake meal, being careful to not deflate the eggs too much.

Place in cake pans and bake about 45 minutes. Cool 5 minutes and remove to cooling rack.

Ganache Frosting:

1/2 c heavy cream or Rich's Whip 1/2 lb. semisweet chocolate chips 1 Tbsp. Sabra liqueur

Heat cream and chips in microwave until chocolate melts. stir till smooth. Add Sabra. Cool until slightly thickened.

Whipped Cream:

1 c whipping cream or Rich's Whip 3 Tbsp. Confectioners sugar 1 Tbsp. Sabra

Whip until stiff peaks form.

Assembly:

Place one cake layer on plate. Spread 1/2 ganache over top, ok if it spills over sides a bit.

Layer 1/2 whipped cream over top. Repeat with 2nd layer.







Istvan: Heroes Stop Nazis, Not Join Them

Today Neo-Nazis are stepping out of the anonymity of the internet and out into the streets. Let's take a look back 70 years at the archetype to see how men of reason and courage put their lives on the line to stop these mass-murderers, not join them. Here is one example with which I am very familiar.

Born in Hungary in 1895, Istvan Vasdenyei, known as Stephen Vasdenyey, was the Commandant of an internment camp near Budapest, Hungary during World War II. He was also my grandfather, married to my widowed grandmother, and lived with her in Kenmore until he died in 1984. My grandmother-Mary "Mimi" Donszky- and Istvan were friendly in Hungary before the War. She owned the cigarette and lottery franchise, and Istvan used to walk her home over one of the bridges to Budafolk. For his actions in saving Jews during World War II, he was awarded the title of "Righteous among the Nations" by Yad Vashem, the Holocaust Memorial in Jerusalem, and a tree bearing his name grows the Avenue of the Righteous at that hallowed site.

Hungary: 1920-1940

During 1920 in Hungary, Admiral Horthy became the Regent, and Hungarians passed laws restricting the right of Jews with quotas to schools, occupations and even restrictions on marriages to Christians. Istvan Vasdenyei was a chief superintendent of police before the War. After November, 1940, the Hungarians joined the Axis, and he was moved to Kistarsca, the internment camp on a railroad line 15 or so kilometers outside Budapest. Before the War the camp held mostly political rabble rousers against the Horthy regime. During the War, it housed Jews, Gypsies, newspapermen, politicians, priests and nuns. But mostly Jews.

1944

Vasdenyei continued to work in Kistarsca, and found the state actions against Jews unconscionable. He repeatedly outwitted the Nazis during the War to save Jewish lives. In 1944, when Jews were rounded up and loaded into cattle cars in Hungary, Vasdenyei let them escape out a back door, some to receive passports out of Hungary from Raoul Wallenberg. When "hostages" under 12 years of age were allowed to leave a Kistarsca "safe house," he disguised young

adults as children—men in short pants and women with cropped hair to gain them passage. Vasdenyei was captured by the Russians at the end of the War, sent first to Georgia and then Siberia, spending 14 years in Soviet Prisons and detention camps. When he was old enough to collect a pension, officials let him leave Hungary.

The United States

Grandpa came to Buffalo in 1964, lived on Kenmore Ave across from the Colvin Theater, then around the corner on Colvin Ave. and is buried in Orchard Park. He kept the books for Custom Made Draperies, a fixture on Kenmore Ave. for decades. On November 11, 1969, he was honored by Yad Vashem at a ceremony in New York City. In attendance were my parents, my grandmother Mary Vasdenyey, Albert Meyer-architect and city planner, and his wife Dr. Marion Preminger-author, lecturer, humanitarian and disciple of the late Albert Schweitzer. There was a reception at the Albert Meyer mansion.

In 1994, the *Rochester Democrat & Chronicle* wrote a story on Oskar Schindler's List with a picture of my then-five-year-old son Stevie holding his great grandfather's Righteous Gentile medal. My

grandfather had no way of knowing that his great grandson, named after him, would be considered Jewish by the Third Reich, as I am married to Tammy, a Jewish woman.

I now have the medal my grandfather was awarded in 1969, and I am so proud that his heroic deeds while a commandant in the Kistarcsa Hungarian Command were recognized by Yad Vashem before his death in 1984. I did not know about his heroism before the Yad Vashem award. In the mid 70's I asked him to tell me some stories about the War. He looked at me sadly as he shook his head and spoke in Hungarian, "the Gestapo wasn't playing games, Johnny. They weren't playing games." I had promised my Grandfather for a very long time that his story would not be forgotten.

John Donsky lives in Rochester. He attended Canisius High School with my husband, Mitch Flynn, and found out about **The Jewish Journal** through high school friends and Buffalo connections. John's story about Istvan is much more complex than this short precis, and comes from the transcripts of the Adolf Eichmann trial, Yad Vashem, a translation of a Voice of America broadcast, and **Raoul Wallenberg: Hero and Victim; His Life and Feats** by Jill Blonsky. He continues to research his grandfather's life. Ellen Goldstein

Jewish Buffalo Visits Florida

The Buffalo Jewish Federation and Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies organized several gatherings in Florida last month for those from our community who winter in the South. At each event, Peter Fleischmann, Director and CEO of Philanthropies, addressed our community's "Assets and Liabilities" and Rob Goldberg, CEO of Federation, spoke about the milestone of Israel's 70 anniversary as an inspiration for the work of community building in Buffalo. These photo memories are from a brunch that was held at the Chabad Boca Central on Sunday, March 4.

Israel at 70-As I See It

Israel will be 70 this year and I'll be 83 in November. I'm "bar mitzvah age" older than my country—a perfect time to reflect on Israel, as I see it.

The first visit Jane and I took to Israel was in 1977. Colleagues in Tel Aviv and Jerusalem agreed to complement the usual tourist sights on tour itinerary. I was astonished at Tel Aviv, having recalled the photograph of the halutzim planting a flag on the sand dunes of the first "Jewish" city in Israel! By the time we got to Jerusalem, I was enamored of the country and began planning for my 1981 sabbatical. The "rest is history." We bought our apartment in Mevaseret in 2006, then made aliyah in 2008.

For sure, Israel has changed since 1981! Our country is now economically sound, our friends are more prosperous and perhaps more materialistic. The country has gone from "pre World War I" to "high tech." Telephones, which seldom worked, useful only as table decorations, are now replaced by ubiquitous smartphones. One thing has not changed: many of Israel's neighbors still aim to destroy this country. The descendants of the Biblical Amalekites abound in the twenty-first century.

A few examples of Israel at 70, from my perspective:

Israel is now energy self-sufficient and soon to become an exporter of energy. Discovery and development of the huge natural gas fields under the Mediterranean Sea have transformed the country, once dependent on coal from South Africa and oil from unreliable "local" sources, to a sought after supplier of natural gas. Agreements are said to be in process for exporting liquefied natural gas to Egypt, Cyprus, Greece, and Turkey.

Traditionally, access to water was a source of contention and conflict in the Middle East. In the early days of our country, drip irrigation technology was developed and enabled crops and plants to thrive with minimal amounts of water. However, that was not sufficient for this arid region. I remember installing flow-limiting devices in our faucets and showers. Water from air conditioners was to be saved for use in the garden and house plants. At one point, importing water from Turkey via tanker was under consideration. Now we are self-sufficient in water and exporting to Jordan.


How did this happen? At present 90% of our waste water is recycled for agriculture and industrial use (although it is safe for consumption). When you travel around the countryside, you'll see the blue pipes and valves indicating that recycled water is being transported. Desalination plants have been built in earnest. Using reverse osmosis technology, 2/3 of our drinking water is via desalination. Foreign governments have sent delegations to Israel to study our procedures. Technology is a notable export!



Unlike Buffalo, we live in a subtropical zone with abundant sunlight. It is to be expected that solar energy should be put to use. Solar panels and storage tanks are ubiquitous on the roofs of private homes and the source of much of our domestic hot water. The Negev Energy Project consists of gigantic thermo-solar plants in the Negev desert. In addition to plants generating electricity from the sun's heat, the plants will also produce a total of 70 megawatts of electricity from sunlight using photovoltaic panels. This combination of technologies in one spot is unprecedented in the world.

These are only a few examples of the "high tech start up nation." One of our most important exports is intellectual property—not sensitive to tariffs!

No survey of Israel at 70 would be adequate without addressing security. We feel safe here, although we are surrounded by the most hardened terrorists in the world: Hezbollah on the Lebanese border, ISIS and Al-Qaeda on the border with Egypt, Hamas in Gaza and the West Bank. We also share a border with Syria and the Iranian Revolutionary Guards. Having fought to keep Assad in power, Iran is now extending a corridor of Iranian-Shia dominance from its own borders through

Iraq and Syria to Hezbollah-dominated Lebanon on the Mediterranean coast.

As for Judea and Samaria-what is the future? As I see it, a two-state solution is the best alternative. The contours of such a solution have been clear for years: Israel withdraws from over 90% of the West Bank, with land swaps for the remainder; Jerusalem is divided along its ethnic lines, with a special regime for the Old City and holy sites; Palestinian refugees are allowed to return to the Palestinian state, but not Israel; the Palestinians recognize Israel as the Jewish state. Let's see what Kushner has in mind!

Here in Israel, we look forward to the joyous celebrations on our 70 years as a sovereign nation. Our prayers are of thanksgiving and for peace-may it come speedily and in our time! CHAG SAMEACH!!

Stepping Away to Step Forward: Hillel's Leadership Retreat

26 hours. 8 student leaders. One team. Hillel of Buffalo is constantly growing and improving through passion, teamwork and perseverance. Rabbi Sara Rich, Executive Director, and Logan King, Coordinator of Jewish Student Life and Ezra Fellow, recently added eight new student leaders. The student leadership team consists of four Engagement Interns: Gabi Silverstein, Marie Meltzer, Sasha Shapiro, and Jen Seidman, Social Interns Daniel Levy and Elizabeth Roth, and Israel Interns Shaya Kalmanofsky and Blake Lobel.


In order to form cohesion as a group, Rabbi Sara and Logan organized a Leadership Retreat for the team at the start of the spring semester. The goal was for the interns to start to set expectations of how they want to work as a group and create a vision of how they want Hillel programming to be portrayed. "I've never experienced such a productive form of enjoyment," remarked Gabi Silverstein.


The program began with an activity in which each person delivered an eight minute speech about their "Soul Story." The Soul Story is a reflection on everyone's own personal histories with Judaism. Sharing these stories encouraged each individual to find their comfort zone within the team by sharing happy, funny, surprising or even sad reflections. "That activity was the beginning of our group's current deep connection," Gabi said. "It was a chance to dive deeper into questions such as: 'What is a key experience that has impacted your Jewish identity?' and 'Has anything surprised you in college, relating to how you felt about Judaism before you came?""

Marie also found the Soul Story activity to be valuable. She remarked, "The Soul Story was my favorite activity. Going into the retreat with little expectations, I was able to learn and understand how every story is different, which is a big part of Judaism, is that we are all different." Marie continued to discuss how holding this position became helpful academically as a freshman studying political science at the University at Buffalo. As an Engagement Intern, it is crucial to be good at talking to people, and trying to understand their stories. These same tools allow students to grasp different views and analyze stories of all sorts of people, and the retreat helped teach the students to do this in an open-minded and confident way.

Another powerful team bonding activity during the retreat is called Boundary Breaking. The students and staff sat in a circle, and the staff took turns asking a question that everyone in the circle had to answer, like "Who is your biggest role model?" and "What would you like to smash?" Before they knew it, it was 1:15AM and a new family was formed. Team work and cohesion are qualities that are very often overlooked in many work or organizational settings. Rabbi Sara and Logan knew that focusing on group dynamics would make a huge impact on how the interns will work as a team and help contribute to the Hillel of Buffalo. We are very excited to see how the team of interns will continue to succeed.

reflecting upon educational practices with the Head of School, meeting with parents, visiting enriching classes, coordinating staff meetings, etc. I am filled with fond memories of Kadimah imbued in my now adult children, and the exciting promise it holds for our current students.

and for each other. I see older students assisting younger ones daily, at lunch, during recess, with computer tablets, and even when visiting our PALS-Kadimah early childhood program to perform or study with the 2, 3 and 4 year olds.

Here, at Kadimah, I see Tikun Olam (acts of caring and kindness to repair the world) daily when the children give tzedakah (charity), respect, and sometimes help our developmentally disabled neighbors at the school we share, or in their compassionate care of our school pet hamster, Oreo. I see love and pride in our Judaism and knowledgeable Jewish children who are the future keepers of our faith, our traditions, and the ethical, moral compass of our lives.

LEARNING TOGETHER ENGAGES A COMMUNITY!

We are so fortunate that Jewish Buffalo is part of the Partnership2Gether, a program through Federation which connects Jews in the diaspora (we are part of a Mid-West consortium) with those living in the Western Galilee region of Israel. While attending the Annual Summit of the Partnership last June, I was introduced to a new adult learning program, Learn2GETHER, which was in the early stages of development. Buffalo and Indianapolis have been asked to pilot this exciting program which will connect our two American communities with members of the Western Galilee.

A select group of adult learners that we hoped would be intrigued by this learning opportunity were invited to meet with Avital Ben Dror, a professional from the Jewish Agency for Israel Partnership2Gether program who visited Buffalo in January. Avital shared additional information about Learn2GETHER as well as provided a taste of the Limmud (learning) that participants will engage in throughout the program.

The Learn2GETHER Program is a unique opportunity, allowing adult learners from our community to connect, study and get to know their peers from Indianapolis and the Western Galilee, while exploring the beauty of the Jewish calendar through Jewish-Israeli literature, rich cultural texts and traditions. The program consists of 10 sessions, including video-conference group and chevruta (partner) learning, meeting from March - October 2018 and includes an optional seminar in Jerusalem in June. Some of the Buffalo participants are planning on travelling to Israel on the Buffalo Israel experience in October, and plans are being made for them to meet with their study partners.

As this pilot program continues over the next few months, we will hear from our local participants, and hopefully, this will be the first of many Learn2GETHER cohorts!



JFS: Social Isolation, Loneliness Can Be A Serious Health Risk For Seniors

People are statistically living longer, thanks in great measure to spectacular advances in science and health care. But with longer life spans come challenges that, for some, can tarnish the glow of Golden Years and actually shorten life itself. Among these, loneliness and social isolation are now considered a life-threatening epidemic among the elder population.

"At JFS, we address the whole person, especially in the support we provide to elders in our community. Providing quality care requires talking and listening compassionately to clients to learn about their individual concerns, and to hear what is not necessarily verbalized but that may be connected to issues of loneliness and isolation. Then we work with each person to develop an individual plan that will help to mitigate or minimize circumstances that may contribute to these damaging states," JFS President and CEO Marlene Schillinger says.

It is generally acknowledged that the rapidly growing elderly population faces physical, psychological and social role changes that may challenge their sense of self and personal happiness. The increased risk of loneliness and social isolation can reasonably be attributed to universal aging processes. These can include loss of a spouse or significant other; shrinking social networks due to the death of close friends, reduced

mobility resulting from illness, disability and sensory impairment (such as hearing loss and vision changes); economic instability; or separation from children and grandchildren who have moved away.

While loneliness and social isolation are often used interchangeably when addressing aging in particular, they are not necessarily the same. Social isolation is objective, and generally occurs when people do not have enough people with which to interact. Loneliness is the subjective experience of distress over not having enough social relationships or enough contact with people. Both pose serious mortality risks to the elderly.

The American Association of Retired Professionals (AARP) recently commissioned a national survey of the 45+ population to examine relationships between loneliness and health, health behaviors, involvement in a social network and use of technology for social communications and networking. Key findings include, among others, that lonely respondents were less likely to be involved in activities that build social networks such as attending religious services, volunteering, participating in a community organization or spending time on a hobby; and that loneliness was a significant predictor of poor

A separate AARP source equates the health risks of prolonged isolation with smoking 15 cigarettes daily, and reports that, according to U.S. Census data, more than 25 percent of U.S. households now consist of only one person, which suggests that Americans in general are becoming less socially connected and experiencing more loneliness.

"Being connected to others socially is widely considered a fundamental human need - crucial to both well-being and survival. Yet an increasing portion of the U.S. population now experiences isolation regularly," Julianne Holt-Lunstad, professor of psychology at Brigham Young University, writes in an AARP website article.

It is important to note that although challenges associated with aging may lead to feelings of loneliness, loneliness should not be mistaken for depression in older adults, who may experience loss of a spouse, siblings or close friends.

"Research shows that elderly depression is a common, widespread problem. Symptoms of depression can understandably be confused with the normal aging process, but depression is not a normal part of getting old. For example, grandmother experienced deep sadness after the loss of my grandfather, but she was not clinically depressed," JFS Development Director Juliana Teibel says.

Depression is a serious clinical illness, for which IFS provides diagnosis, comprehensive counseling, treatment and support for families and individuals of all ages. The agency also provides comprehensive support for elders through its health home and care coordination services, family counseling for both elders and caregivers, and mental health assessment.

"A founding part of the JFS mission is to enable older adults to live with dignity and purpose in their homes and our community, and JFS helped my grandmother cope during a time of immense life change. She was grieving the loss of my grandfather, her partner and best friend of 60 years, while also dealing with her move to Weinberg Campus," Teibel explained. "We work hard at Jewish Family Service to educate our community to the nuances of mental illness, and to extend a compassionate lifeline for aging well and aging in place. This support includes connection and referral not only to our comprehensive JFS programs, but to any outside services that will reduce the risk and repercussion posed by loneliness and social isolation among our precious elder population," Teibel





Gun Violence Prevention: A Teenager's Point of View

Amidst all the words that were written about the February Parkland, Florida high school shooting, I came across a beautiful poem written by a girl named Sam. She went to Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School on February 14th, her birthday, expecting nothing out of the ordinary except birthday wishes from her friends. Instead, what she experienced was a horrific tragedy that will resonate with all of us for a long time. After reading Sam's poem on Twitter, I curiously tapped on her account. This generation differs drastically from the last, and the teens and youth of the current generation are the only ones who have true experience with the effect gun violence has on students. 25 years ago, it never would've crossed anyone's mind to practice lockdown drills in schools. Now in 2018, lockdown drills are a monthly routine for students of all ages, and recently, many have not been just drills.

We need to take action now, because although thoughts and prayers are nice, they aren't making this issue any better. 
