

Post Poway: A Call for Action

Last month, my husband Jim and I were in Pittsburgh to celebrate and attend our son Joey's college graduation. On Saturday morning, we took a walk through the beautiful Shadyside and Squirrel Hill neighborhoods. We wanted to enjoy the spring day but also to visit the Tree of Life Synagogue, perhaps to join the worshipers in Shabbat and Pesach worship. We wanted to somehow connect with this community—to share our solidarity and to experience their strength in the wake of the heartbreak and tragedy of October.

We were disappointed but not surprised to see, when we arrived at the synagogue, that it is still closed and fenced off. But we were heartened to see the art displayed on the lawn, wooden stars decorated by children from other communities, expressing words of comfort and support. We noted many homes displaying "Hate Has No Home Here" lawn signs. Some of the signs were in several languages, including English, Spanish and Arabic. There were people out walking and jogging. Life was carrying on. These were some of the indications that the community is moving forward, doing something positive in the wake of horror.

It is our nature as Jews to move forward. We don't, like some cultures, encourage the harboring of grudges and feuds from generation to generation. We support each other, and through our actions we advance rather than get stuck.

Later that afternoon as we prepared to attend the graduation ceremony, we learned of the shooting at the Chabad synagogue in Poway, CA. We were devastated. I was notified of the swift action being taken in our community to ensure the safety of our synagogues and agencies. Our newly hired Community Security Coordinator, Susan Case DeMari, was already communicating and coordinating with our local law enforcement agencies to protect our most vulnerable institutions: our synagogues on Pesach/Shabbat. (See page 5 for more on our Community Security Coordinator).

In the midst of this second, horrific assault



in six months, we took immediate action. We did not sit by wringing our hands or wondering what we

The Jewish community will protect itself. Our synagogues and agencies will take the necessary measures to create secure institutions, and now with our Community Security Coordinator in place, we will have an organized method to communicate with Law Enforcement and for them to communicate with us, ensuring the most efficient and effective action.

But what must we do as individuals? What active measures must we take to move forward in our daily lives, to bring light, knowledge, and understanding to both our Jewish and the greater, non Jewish communities?

Following the Tree of Life shooting, just like communities across the country, we in Buffalo took action. Among other things, we participated in 2forSeder, an initiative started by Marnie Fienberg, daughter-in-law of Joyce Fienberg, one of the 11 murdered at the Tree of Life in October. This new initiative encourages Jews to host guests of other faiths at our Seders, in order to build bridges among us. So, the week prior to Joey's graduation we hosted a Sikh family at our Seder. It was fun and interesting, and it felt great to share our home, customs and beliefs with them. A total of 74 guests participated in Buffalo's first year of 2forSeder. Here's the website which will give you more details: https://2forseder.

And now Poway. Many of us know by now who Rabbi Yisroel Goldstein is - the leader of the Poway Chabad Synagogue. We have seen the YouTube videos and we have read his incredibly strong and moving opinion piece which was published in The New York Times two days after the shooting. We are comforted and inspired by this man who loves his Judaism and who reacted to the horrible shooting, in which he was badly injured, with a deeper commitment to his Judaism and the Jewish people.

Rabbi Goldstein's message wasn't about revenge or even about security. Nor was it about fear. He spoke out against the shooter (who he referred to appropriately as a teenager), but most importantly and impactful for me, he called for action and spoke of being a proud Jew. He implored the greater Jewish community to participate in a

Shabbat of Light and Kindness, to go to synagogue and find strength and comfort there with each other, but more importantly, to make a statement that says: We are Jewish, we are proud, and we will be even stronger now. Hundreds in our community did just that.

But for those who would rather not go to synagogue, we need you too. Our people are synagogue goers, but we are also those who do not go to synagogue. Each member of our community is an ambassador of good will, and we need you. In Jewish Buffalo, our JCRC took the Rabbi's lead and created a toolkit dedicated to create a 'Shabbat of Kindness," both in a synagogue but also in one's home. Our goal was to enable any individual in the community to access resources to acknowledge the shooting, honor those who were injured and died, and to perform acts of kindness as the best way to fight hate.

I invite each of us to "Do Jewish" the way YOU want to. Be a proud Jew. Connect with others, do deeds of kindness. In Hebrew kindness is chesed. and we are commanded to do acts of chesed. Perhaps you'll find a new connection joining in one or more of the vast community programming listed on page 28, and also listed in Federation's new weekly email "My Jewish Buffalo". Perhaps you will invite a neighbor for Shabbat dinner or a Sunday BBQ. It all matters.

Law enforcement and security measures will protect the physical signs of our Jewish community. Each of us must share in protecting its spirit.

What will you do?

MUSSAR FOR COUPLES

Have you heard friends or others in Jewish Buffalo talking about Mussar? Mussar is a Jewish spiritual tradition that offers tools for living a more balanced, meaningful and ethical life. Mussar practice involves studying Jewish texts, meeting with a small group of peers, and engaging in personal contemplative practices and exercises.

Mussar for Couples was developed as a year-long program which used Mussar to guide couples of multiple faiths through a Jewish learning experience, emphasizing how a celebration of Jewish time could help them integrate Judaism into the natural rhythms of their lives. The program (funded through a grant from the National Center to Encourage Judaism, and the contributions of several other passionate donors) offered tools for living a more balanced, meaningful and ethical life. Seven couples participated in this first cohort, representing all ages and stages of life.

In the context of this program, Mussar Middot/character traits were paired with a Jewish holiday, i.e. Shabbat with Kedushah/Holiness and Passover with Tzedek/Justice. The program began with the trait of Kavod/Honor, recognizing that even with differences in religious upbringings, we could respect those differences and find shared values. In December, the group's focus shifted to Hanukkah and Hakarat Hatov/ Gratitude, we talked about what it means to bring light to others



during times of darkness and to remember to count our own blessings and express our gratitude. We celebrated Purim with Zerizut/Enthusiasm, fulfilling two of four major Purim observances by sending edible treats to our friends through Purim baskets (shlach manot) and feasting with some beer and spirit tastings!

At each gathering, participants were given simple practices to work on at home. These practices were designed to help couples integrate the new middah into their lives, and offer creative ideas to enrich their Jewish holiday experiences. Through group text study and discussions, guided meditations and holiday celebrations, the participating couples told their stories and family traditions, while creating a community of friendship and shared experiences.

Does this sound like something you want to be part of? The Center for Jewish Engagement and Learning will be offering 5 new Mussar experiences in the upcoming academic year, including two opportunities to participate in a year-long experience like Mussar for Couples called"Living a Jewish Year." More information about our 2019/2020 Mussar cohorts will become available over the summer. However, please reach out if you would like to learn more. CULTURAL SHIFTS: RETHINKING TEEN ENGAGEMENT

In my Jewish Buffalo wanderings this past year, I have had the privilege of meeting many extraordinary teenagers and their equally amazing parents. As I chat with adults about their teens, one common theme rings true: the world today looks so different compared to when these parents of teens were the same age. Think about how teens communicate (textspeak, Snapchat, Instagram); their ability to instantly access to all kinds of information; changing social norms around fashion; fluidity of gender/religious/cultural identity; and, our collective jam-packed overflowing calendars. Daily life has changed dramatically in the last 30 years.

These cultural shifts in everyday life have understandably let to dramatic changes for Jewish organizational life as well. And this is not just a Buffalo challenge: communities small and large across North America have observed a large decrease in the number of children and teens who participate in traditional Jewish experiences such as religious school, day school, youth group, and Hebrew High School - all hallmarks of the traditional Jewish educational landscape that were a part of our lives for decades.

So, engaging teens in Jewish living and learning experiences today requires us to develop and implement new strategies and systems, designed not to mitigate the cultural realities

of 2020 but rather to embrace them.

Our recognition that Jewish teens in Buffalo need different kinds of Jewish experiences has been the focus of much time and attention over the last few months. Ellen Weiss, Chair of the Center for Jewish Engagement and Learning (CJEL) and CJEL









Teen Engagement Chair, Hadar Borden have gathered teens, parents, and community partners for a series of Teen Engagement Workshops. The goal of these workshops was to be in conversation with teens and their families about what Buffalo's Jewish teen engagement and teen leadership efforts could look like in the coming years.

Using feedback from the Teen Engagement Workshops, data from surveys of Buffalo teens and parents done in 2015 and 2018, and research done by national Jewish organizations, we are beginning to craft a new series of Jewish living and learning opportunities to offer Buffalo's teens. The new teen experiences, which will begin to roll out in the fall of 2019 will aim to help teens authentically encounter Judaism —Jewish wisdom, text, time, relationships, and memory - in the context of their complex daily lives. Experiences will be designed to be accessible; to fit into the natural flow of a teen's and their family's life so that teens can build their knowledge, self-esteem, leadership and life skills, and shape their identity. More information about Teen offerings through the CJEL will be available in the late summer.

The voices of parents and teens are an essential part of this ongoing design process. So, if you were not able to attend a Teen Engagement Workshop or if your teen has never participated in a Jewish learning experience or you just want to know more or have ideas to share, please be in touch. NICKEL CITY JEWS: REFLECTIONS ON LEADERSHIP

Growing up, I remember my dad always saying to me, "If you want something done right, do it yourself," and that is the very quote that popped into my head in early March when I realized that Passover was right around the corner.

Passover has always been my favorite Jewish holiday. I love the Seders, the traditions, the songs, (most of them) the food and time spent with loved ones. So, imagine the challenge I was faced with when my husband and I moved to Buffalo over three years ago and were not able to find a Seder that fit all of our needs. A Seder that was modern, yet traditional. Solemn at times, but also uplifting. In short- a perfect Seder! I got to wondering, does such a Seder actually exist? Then, the words of my father came to me, "Do it yourself." But how?

This is where Nickel City Jews (NCJ) came to my rescue. During



my time on the NCJ leadership team as both a member of the Executive Committee and now as Co-President, I have found that NCJ exists for me and for every young adult (professional or student) looking to find their niche in Jewish Buffalo. Nickel City Jews provided the infrastructure,



the support, and the gentle nudge I needed to design my own Seder experience, the perfect one I had been searching for.

After many coffee dates, hours of organizing, a lot of cooking including exploding an egg in the microwave - creating a custom Hagaddah to blend the old with the new, Instagram promoting, and too many last-minute Wegmans runs, the Nickel City Seder was born. For me, the Seder was, well,

perfect. Through a Passover miracle, we managed to fit ten people (six of whom I had never met previously) into my tiny apartment; we sang songs, ate a tremendous amount of food, laughed, told stories, and most importantly, we made new friends.

When I realized that I needed a customized Seder, I turned to the best resource I had- Nickel City Jews- and created something memorable, personally relevant, and impactful. NCJ is a flexible platform, and our leadership team is so willing to do the work necessary to organize events to help all of Buffalo's Jewish young adults feel at home in our community or create a community of their own. Looking at our calendar, I see so many unique events planned that we have never done before, like a Maccabi games that will be held in July, and a Dungeons and Dragons campaign starting in June.

Federation Recieves \$100,000 Security Grant

The Secure Jewish Buffalo Fund was created by the Buffalo Jewish Federation in the wake of the massacre at Pittsburgh's Tree of Life Synagogue. Its purpose was singular: to better protect and prepare local religious institutions.

Following this tragic event, The Buffalo Jewish community worked in partnership with New York State Senator Tim Kennedy (D-Buffalo) to secure a \$100,000 grant in the New York State budget for the Federation's *Secure Jewish Buffalo Fund*. The fund, which has already raised over \$120,000, is focused on security upgrades and training for the local synagogues and other Jewish institutions in Jewish Buffalo.

"Western New York is built on diversity. and we embrace citizens of all faiths, races, and beliefs," said Senator Kennedy during a press conference announcing the gift this spring "In the past year, we have seen heinous hate crimes committed against members of the Jewish community in Pittsburgh, the Muslim community in New Zealand, and all across our country. We wholly reject this ideology of hatred, and today we are demonstrating our commitment to protecting the right of all New Yorkers to peacefully express their religious beliefs. I applaud the Buffalo Jewish Federation for proactively working to secure the local Jewish community and for their eagerness to include Western New York's Muslim community in their efforts."

Joining the Senator for the conference were Leslie Shuman Kramer, President of Federation and Rabbi Jonathan Freirich, President of the Buffalo Board of Rabbis and Cantors. "Following the recent attack in Pittsburgh, and the rise of anti-Semitism both inside and outside of this country,

our Jewish community has prioritized increasing security to ensure the safety of our institutions and anybody who visits them," said Kramer. "We are grateful to Senator Kennedy for his unwavering support both for our community and this endeavor, and together with over a hundred thousand dollars raised within our community since December, this grant will allow us to get the professional guidance and security systems we deem are necessary."

"We so appreciate living in our region of good neighbors," said Rabbi Freirich. "Our elected officials, especially Senator Kennedy, remind us every day of the value of a caring community. We cannot offer enough thanks for the advocacy that leads us all to be more secure in our places of gathering."

The Passover attack at the Chabad in Poway, California was another reminder of the growing danger of anti-Semitism in our country and why Federation created the Secure Jewish Buffalo Fund last December.

In addition to raising nearly \$120,000 for the Fund, Federation received a grant from the State of New York that was secured through the efforts of Senator Tim Kennedy (D- Buffalo). (Read about the new grant on page 6.)

"Investing in facility security improvements and training, and coordinating with all levels of law enforcement to enhance the safety and well-being of Jewish Buffalo is among our highest priorities," said Rob Goldberg, Federation's CEO. "That's why shortly after establishing the Secure Jewish Buffalo Fund, Federation assembled a task force to determine the best course of action to make our community more secure. After speaking with leadership of the Secure Community Network (SCN) of the Jewish Federation and a host of other experts, the task force recommended hiring Susan DeMari as our first Security Coordinator."



DeMari, a native Buffalonian, holds a similar position for the Syracuse Jewish Community. She began her efforts in mid-April assisting Jewish Buffalo in proactively addressing this most serious challenge for the community as a whole and focus on observed deficiencies in community security. After the shooting at the Chabad, Susan immediately engaged with municipal law enforcement agencies to address the reality of a potential increased threat to the Jewish community. In response, law enforcement committed resources to include increased patrols and a presence in and around our Jewish



community and facilities out of an abundance of caution.

In early May, DeMari met with leadership from 14 synagogues/ agencies to better understand their needs and concerns and addressed the Federation Board of Governors at their May meeting. "After meeting everyone, I am optimistic that together, we can lessen the threat and have better protection by being prepared," said DeMari. "I am committed to assuring the successful implementation of a protocol for communication in securityrelated matters, which law enforcement agrees is critical to the success and overall effectiveness of safety for the Buffalo Jewish community. Helping to develop and prepare for the potential threat of harm, in partnership with law enforcement, requires a collective responsibility of cooperation to pursue enhanced security measures."



Buffalo Open Seder Engages Partners From Other Faiths

The Buffalo Jewish Community Relations Council introduced the first-ever Buffalo Open Seder. Over 74 people of other faiths, cultures and ethnicities participated in Jewish community Seders across Buffalo. Guests included African-American. American Baptist, Buddhist, Catholic, Muslim, Presbyterian and Sikh community members.

Buffalo Open Seder conducted a post-survey that indicated goals of fostering meaningful relationships with people from other communities were achieved. In essence, sharing a Seder with the themes of freedom, resilience and generational storytelling is key to building friendships.

Some Results: 86% of hosts agreed or strongly agreed it was important to invite people of other communities to a Passover Seder.

71% of hosts agreed or strongly agreed that guests of other backgrounds now have a better understanding of the Jewish people or Judaism.

99% of hosts agreed or strongly agreed that other Jewish guests at their Passover Seder felt comfortable with people from other communities.



100% of participants agreed or strongly agreed (80%) there should be a Buffalo Open Seder in 2020.

Some comments: A Christian guest shared at the end of the Seder saying, "Learning about Passover feels like returning home and knowing there's still more to learn





about friends who we have been far from." One host said, "The highlight was

having our guests recite the Four Questions in their native tongue."

A second host noted, "Our guests were honored to be included and brought special gifts. They were as touched to be invited as we were to host them."







Buffalo was also part of "2forSeder" an initiative to combat anti-Semitism started by Marnie Fienberg, daughter-in-law of a Tree of Life shooting victim. The "2forSeder' goal of hosting 1000 people of other backgrounds at Seders in the US and Canada was achieved. Buffalo Open Seder participants were included in that figure.

I've lived on three continents, and traveled through dozens of countries, and I have to admit that one of my very favorite places on Earth is just a short flight away-The Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City. Visitors' eyes fall upon the exquisiteness of the human endeavor-time and time again-as they meander the Met's halls and galleries, immersed in thousands of years of human expression. And for all its rotating collections and changing exhibits, there is a constant, timeless quality to it. It's vast, and cavernous.

Several years ago, a contemporary photography exhibit surveyed a number of Middle Eastern portraits and urban landscapes. There were a couple pieces that really drew me in. But, one in particular gripped me and

> would not let me go. It was a photo of a young girl, pushing a rusty shopping cart partially filled with

> what appeared to be garbage. Upon further inspection, however, the garbage was fairly mundane household "stuff"-things made of plastic, some broken. There were some tin cans (presumably still full). Some wiring and cardboard seemed to top off her cargo. She was amongst rubble in an abandoned square. Doors were shut, windows shuttered, buildings made of typical Israeli stone and concrete, and the square was located just south of Jerusalem in Beit Lechem (Bethlehem as it's better known in the US). The girl appeared to be Arab, and the photo was titled "Ruth Gleaned the Fields."

> On Shavuot, as we celebrate God's gift of the Torah, we read the Book of Ruth. As I read Ruth, however, my mind sees this photograph at the Met. It presented such a stinging contrast. On one hand the title conjures up the Biblical loving-kindness and ultimate inclusivity shown to an outsider (Ruth). And on the other hand, the visual composition of the photo forces us to examine the pains of division and struggle in modern-day Israel. Two powerful topics, both of which evoke powerful opinions and emotions. And that was the photographer's goal. This photograph was not trying to make a political statement. Rather, the photographer used the stark juxtaposition of time and story to invite us into a much deeper conversation of how humanity plays out and why.

Biblical scholars like Dr. Adele Berlin (Professor Emerita at the University of Maryland) suggest that the Book of Ruth is a lesson on welcoming outsiders. The text makes us question who we are and who we are not—examining where we draw the line between "us" and "them," and why? Ruth was a "them" and then became a part of "us." The photo at the Met, however, gave no conclusions. It leaves us wondering what became of the girl. With only the photo as guidance, whether she was welcomed into safety or completely shut out is left up to our imaginations. Given

all this, in this season of Shavuot I cannot help but look to the US southern border.

I once overheard two Jewish men having a conversation on a park bench in sight of Liberty Island in New York City. One said to the other, "It's good to sit here and see her [the Statue of

Liberty] on Shavuos." Ruth begins with hardship and migration and results in King David. The Book of Ruth is actually a story of our people in America. Not so very long ago, we endured hardship and came here as Lady Liberty's poor huddled masses. And we rose to the heights of success and leadership. It is shameful that those presently in power and the many that put them there are forcing Liberty to turn a cold shoulder and look the other way. Our biblical forebears welcomed the stranger with lovingkindness and were greatly rewarded. It's time for us to do the same. What lies before us is the gift of opportunity to bring in the stranger as our own, to spread and to cultivate through lovingkindness, the exquisiteness of the human endeavor. What better way could there possibly be to celebrate God's gift of Torah.

SEEKING A DONOR MATCH

Hello. My name is Jordan Crowley. I don't know exactly how to do this, so I'll just tell you my story. I was born three months prematurely with a large tumor on my lower spine. I also had cysts on



my kidneys-and only one of them was functioning. My prognosis was grim, but I was strong-and able to overcome all of the obstacles and survive. Throughout the years, I continued to face and overcome numerous other health impairments to survive. I am now facing yet another major obstacle.

The kidney function in my good kidney has deteriorated greatly. Soon I will be at the point where my treatment options will be limited to dialysis or a kidney transplant!

Dialysis would help my kidney do it's job, but it is very time consuming and would limit my activities. A transplant would be the best option-but the wait for a kidney from a deceased donor is over 5 years, and there are over 100,000 people on that waiting list! The other option is finding a living donor- someone who is willing to give me one of their kidneys. Since most people can live long, healthy lives with one kidney, this option would be best for me.

Kidneys from living donors work faster once transplanted; Kidneys from living donors usually last longer than kidneys from deceased donors; And the wait time is shorter. The surgery can be scheduled once a matching donor is found.

I am hoping to find someone that would consider giving me a kidney. This person would have to be a healthy adult who is up to date on medical testing. My transplant team will check everything to ensure that vou are able to donate.

Two New Books from Rabbi Heschel Greenberg



The first book, a scholarly work, titled Ma'aseh Yisroel-Volume Five. is a collection of Talmudic discourses on dozens of diverse topics of Jewish law.

The second book, Light From the Future - Essays on the Haggadah, is a collection of over 40 essays on the Passover Haggadah. This volume also includes a second edition of three other books: The Kabbalah of the Seder; Ten Plague Therapy; and Chad Gadya.







As has already been publicized on these pages and in the wider Buffalo news media, Kadimah Academy, as we have known it for the past sixty years, will be closing its doors at the end of this school year. The new partnership that has been developed with The Park School of Buffalo is exciting and groundbreaking, and those who dedicated themselves to finding a new model to deliver on our mission of educating Jewish youth in Buffalo and Western NY deserve great commendation for their vision, creativity, and commitment. Several of our current students are currently preparing to begin their next school year as "Kadimah Scholars at Park School," as are others not previously affiliated with us.

While we celebrate the beginning of this partnership, we must also acknowledge that many of our emotions are bittersweet. Our history of sixty years of commitment to an independent brick-and-mortar nondenominational all-day Jewish Day School deserves homage. The word "Kadimah" means "forward" in Modern Hebrew. It was chosen in recognition of the growing popularity of the language in the newly-created Israeli state, and it accurately represented the spirit of the founders' hopes for the school: Forwardlooking, forward-thinking, and dynamic. We have never wavered from that purpose.

We continue to honor our founders, the



decades' worth of Board members, Principals and Heads of School, Office and Maintenance Staff, and the hundreds of faculty members over the years who imparted wisdom in Torah, Hebrew, Israel, and secular studies to the thousands of students who have attended Kadimah. Our alumni took their love and knowledge of all things Jewish and their solid academic training and have made remarkable, honorable, and successful lives and careers all over the United States and the world. May the "Kadimah Scholars at Park" continue in their footsteps!


In the meantime, studies and activities galore continue in our building. Our Purim Celebrations spanned an entire week of fun, food, games, and costumes. At the invitation of the Roswell Park Comprehensive Cancer Center's Diversity Council, students from Grades 1-4 conducted a Model Seder at Roswell in early April for members of their staff. Jews and non-Jews in the audience were all significantly impressed by the



level of knowledge our kids displayed. They performed the Seder again at school for their parents, as did our Kindergarten students. It was delightful to see our older students singing along with our youngest ones as they recalled their own Model Seders.

Our 5th-8th Grade students created a Poetry Café and read their works to the rest of the school. They also presented an extremely ceremony moving on Yom HaShoah to honor the memory of the Six Million Iews who perished in the Holocaust. That same day, Kadimah students stood with NYS Senator





Chris Jacobs, as he announced new legislation he is sponsoring to strengthen Holocaust education in schools across the state.

Some of our Middle School students continued to fulfill their Better Together mission by visiting seniors at Jewish Federation Housing and playing Wii Bowling with them. Recent Kadimah alumni sang at the community Yom HaShoah observance. We stood and listened to the siren on Yom HaZikaron, and celebrated the 71st Birthday of Israel on Yom Ha'Atzmaut with more singing, dancing, and birthday

At the time of this writing, plans are in the works for another joyous Lag B'Omer Bowling Adventure, and for our Siddur Presentation, Graduation, end-of-year projects and exams, and for our final days in the building we have called home for the past 14 years. Bittersweet.

UB STUDENTS OFFER THE OPPORTUNITY TO SAVE A LIFE

"Do you want to save a life?" This is the question Allana Rosenberg, Nathaniel Davenport, and Michael Dubin pose to students passing through the lobby of the UB Commons on their way to class. These three students are GIFT OF LIFE CAMPUS AMBASSADORS, and are offering students the opportunity to sign up for the stem cell and bone marrow donation registry, and potentially the opportunity to one day save the life of a person in need.

Allana, Nathaniel and Michael applied directly to the Gift of Life Campus Ambassador program, and then chose to partner with Hillel of Buffalo in order to have a larger platform on campus for reaching students. They have collaborated with Hillel for two registry drives



so far this semester, and have successfully added 85 students to the registry. The procedure is quick and simple – students fill out a quick questionnaire online and swab the inside of their cheek, and the ambassadors mail the samples to Gift of Life, who add them to the registry.

Nathaniel finds it incredibly gratifying that students are willing to step out of their routine for a few minutes to register. "I acknowledge that it's weird to be asked 'Do you want to save a life?' in the middle of the day, and it takes a special person to immediately say yes." Allana adds, "It's really heartwarming to see that students at UB are so ready to help contribute to this amazing cause! Regardless if cancer has touched your life or not, there are people out there every day suffering from these painful illnesses whose lives could be changed with a five minute registration process and a simple cheek swab. It's truly amazing work."

Hillel looks forward to continuing to partner with the **Gift** of Life Campus Ambassadors by providing opportunities for them to reach out to students by the Hillel Center or during Hillel programming.







SC: Describe some of the prime motivators that led you to write your memoir.

CBO: Friends laughed when I shared colorful stories about being a cantor or about synagogue life. I began scribbling vignettes and transcribing old journal entries. The most meaningful scribbles were the ones that made it into Catbird.

SC: What pushed you from scribbling to publishing?

CBO: I've known for a long time that your secrets can eat you alive. Mine were consuming me, one bite at a time. I decided to use the book to tell the kinds of secrets that many women feel compelled to keep. I hope my book frees others to let their secrets out, and avoid the scary side-effects of harboring them.

SC: Help readers to understand how you overcame hesitations to share your complete story so candidly.

CBO: It hurt to remember distressing events, but even more painful

readers. Should I publish these private details? I decided that if an episode in my story (however challenging it was to write or read) might resonate with people or keep readers company, I would share it. I've already heard from many readers who feel

was actually typing them out. I realized graphic

parts of Catbird would be hard for readers, too.

I wrestled with myself, and with my imagined

validated by certain themes. Bullying, body image, infertility. These are real parts of our lives. Many women are like me, going through life as though it were one endless audition for approval. The hardest themes that I address in Catbird are things like eating disorders, cutting and sexual trauma. I discovered in the writing, and from readers who had similar experiences, that the "reveal" is an essential first step. My main message is that life can get better! You don't have to remain stuck in the scary parts! There's music, nature, books! There's your synagogue or community!

But, making the transition from stuck, scared and silent to BETTER takes more than beauty and belonging. For me, it took the work of therapy. I'm proud to say I still go to therapy! Therapy has helped me free myself from a lot of anxiety. It's my ongoing route to finding confidence and even joy.

SC: You prepared multiple "Reader's Guides" to help start conversations about your book. Thank you! Help us to understand your hopes for people as they answer these

two questions: First, "Is there a specifically Jewish message in Catbird?"

CBO: Honestly, "Jewish message" can be read as "ethical message" for everyone. When I was a child, I found happiness and truth in Temple, in Shabbat services, in religious school and in junior choir! I heard about Civil Rights, about the prophets and about behaving in a way that was godly. I LOVED the language, the fancy English and the mysterious Hebrew. I LOVED the cantor's voice and the screech of the shofar! (Truth be told. I also liked the ice cream kids got at the end of services!)

SC: And second, "Has Catbird influenced your Jewish identity?"

CBO: I hope everyone will find this book speaking directly to them. I hope that Jewish readers think, "YES! Like Barbi Prim, I also love hearing someone chant from the Torah or get goosebumps during a sermon." All the prayers we recite and all the melodies we sing become part of us. It's good to think about the Jewish things in our lives and about where they live inside us.

SC: Topics related to family members are woven throughout your book. Help us understand how readers who have difficult family members could be assisted by the complex reflections you share.

CBO: It's really good when family members sit across from each other and talk about whatever they're thinking. When I was a fortysomething mother, I side-stepped that kind of talking. I was too involved in soldiering through my days. My children suffered because I was a difficult family member. In some ways, this book is an apology to my kids. I realize I can't rewind the tape of their adolescence. BUT I have ongoing chances to be a better mom. These days, I am a rock-star grandmother: just ask my grandkids!


Move Over Wonder Woman - The Real One is Coming to Buffalo!

Buffalo's Jewish Film Festival this past March featured some truly amazing films. On March 25th and 28th, The TELLL Fund, in memory of Dr. Samuel Shatkin and Joan Ellis Shatkin, ob"m, sponsored 93 Queen. This 2018, award-winning documentary, was produced by Paula Eiselt and Heidi Reinberg, and features the women of Ezras Nashim, the first ever women's-only Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) corps, spearheaded by Judge Rachel "Ruchie" Freier, the well-known, Chassidic women's activist. The producer, Ms. Eiselt (who herself is an observant Jew) has "insider access" that would normally not be available in this closely knit, insular community. With unprecedented entrée, 93 Queen offers up the unique portrayal of a group of empowered women who are taking matters into their own hands changing their community from within.

The film and Mrs. Freier's team's efforts touch personal heartstrings and internal, visceral cords of the TELLL Fund. The TELLL Fund is proud to be one of the sponsors of The Buffalo International Jewish Film Festival and the JCC Book & Arts Fair this year, and promotes Torahtrue educational and cultural events in Western New York. As many of you know, our parents were great in their respective community roles. Our father, Dr. Samuel Shatkin, was a prominent plastic surgeon, taking care of emergency, trauma victims, as well as others in pain and need. Our mother, Joan Ellis Shatkin, was a prominent Jewish community leader, activist, philanthropist, communicator, social genius, and civil servant eternal. The uncanny themes of this film parallel the mission of The TELLL Fund in memory of our illustrious parents - caring for people, physically, medically, and in all ways standing up and standing strong to lead the way and improve what is put before us, however challenging the obstacle may be to surmount.

In an interview, Judge Freier said that her mother told her she could succeed in anything in life as long as it is not illegal, immoral, or against the Torah. Similar to the words of the Rebbe Maharash, Rabbi Shmuel the 5th Lubavitcher Rebbe: "The whole world says if you can't get around it, go over it. I say, in the first place, go over it." The women of Ezras Nashim (women

helping women) in the 93 Queen documentary and Judge Freier's community accomplishments are monumental, expending incredible fortitude, patience, diligence, and good ol' Jewish chutzpah! Determined, the Judge was able to go against all odds. As she says, "If you can't join 'em, beat 'em!"

On Father's Day, Sunday June 16th, The TELLL Fund is bringing Judge Freier to Buffalo to inspire our community with her amazing accomplishments as the iconoclastic Chassidic women's advocate, ac-

tivist, lawyer, and civil court judge! Rachel Freier is a proud, devoted mother and grandmother of a Chassidic family. She is dedicated to her local Borough Park community specifically, and reaches out to the general Jewish community at-large. Rachel Freier, known as "Ruchie" by her friends and family, was elected as Civil Court Judge in November 2016 and is currently assigned to Kings County Criminal Court. Prior to becoming a judge, she maintained law offices in Borough Park and Monroe, N. Y. Licensed to practice law in New York, New Jersey and Washington, DC, she was recently honored as one of Brooklyn Law School's 'Trailblazers' for being the first Chassidic woman to be elected to public office. After graduating law school, Rachel founded Chasdei Devorah, Inc., a nonprofit charity in memory of her friend who passed away at a young age. Thereafter, she formed B'Derech, a grassroots non-profit organization advocating for education and opportunity for adolescents in the Chassidic community.

When a group of Chassidic female EMTs in Borough Park asked Rachel to assist them in their desire to serve other women during emergencies, her offer to help them mushroomed into directing a global, grassroots all-women's volunteer agency known as Ezras Nashim. In order to be a more effective leader, she became an EMT. Thereafter she attended The Center for Learning & Innovation at North Shore Long Island Health/Northwell Health for her paramedic training.

We hope the Buffalo Jewish community is excited as we are that the Honorable Judge Rachel Freier will be joining us at the JCC Book & Arts Fair on Father's Day, Sunday June 16th at 2:30pm at the JCC Benderson Family Building. ground. You are finally at peace. The bat-


tle is over. I love you forever and always.



Marlene Schillinger "Rebooting" After 25 Years

After 25 years, Marlene A. Schillinger is leaving the helm of Jewish Family Service of Buffalo & Erie County. "I'm rebooting," she says with a wry smile, adding that she has been a bit uncomfortable with the attention she is receiving since announcing her retirement.

Inarguably, the recognition is well deserved. Rooted tenaciously in the tenets of her Jewish faith and cultural traditions of her community, Schillinger has dedicated both personal life and professional career to unmitigated advocacy for social justice.

"Our background in Judaism influences where we are today," she says of growing up in Bayside, Queens, NY with her family -the oldest and only girl, with three brothers who are now medical and healthcare practitioners. "I was happy when I got the job at Jewish Family Service because it melded together the things that were important to me, which were practicing our traditions and values and putting them into action for social change."

She left Bayside to pursue a bachelor's degree in English and theater at the University at Buffalo (UB), where she also earned her teaching certificate. After teaching briefly in the Buffalo public school system and deciding "it really didn't fit my personality or style of working with people," she took a job teaching high school equivalency preparation at the now-defunct Clarkson Center, formally Allentown Youth Services. "I still run into old clients from time to time," she says. "We're like family, and there's no better feeling."

Schillinger spent 18 years at Clarkson Center, earning her master's degree in education from UB along the way. When she left she was assistant director, but admits she faced a steep learning curve when she became JFS executive director in 1994.

"You don't always know what you don't know," she says, smiling wryly again. "But I had a lot of support, in terms of relationships and reinforcements. And I was really fortunate because I inherited a strong agency."

She is leaving Jewish Family Service of Buffalo & Erie County an even stronger agency. Named president and CEO by the JFS board in 1999 under her leadership, the 155-year-old not for profit has successfully traversed the myriad changes and

challenges defining best practice in 21st century mental health care and social service delivery.

Her strategic vision has focused on the importance of family, however defined, extended and embraced. Administratively, she has cultivated partnerships, optimized management and integrated services to ensure every JFS client is treated as a whole person. "There are a lot of things that go into making you well, physically, spiritually and emotionally," she explains. "You can't separate the head from the body and heart. It's all connected and the environment you live in plays an important role."

Addressing such social determinants of health-which include access to adequate housing, employment, health care, food resources, transportation and social supports is why care management is now fully fused into the JFS scope of services.

"There's more recognition now of how these things play into people's health and well-being. Care management helps people navigate the various systems they come in contact with, "says Schillinger, adding that upgrading the JFS career services component has also been a viable response to this change.

While comprehensive outpatient mental health diagnosis, treatment and counseling have been core IFS services since the 1950s, in 1996 Schillinger added a specific component for children and adolescents. "We always helped kids with issues like acting out in school. But we also wanted to move toward a preventative model that tried to make changes that would help the whole family," she says.

As a co-founder of the Erie County Anti-





Stigma Coalition, key facilitator of its "Join the Conversation" anti-stigma campaign, and certified Mental Health First Aid trainer, Schillinger has helped establish the agency as a regional "difference maker" in diminishing barriers that prevent people from accessing care that can improve their quality of life.

In partnership with the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society (HIAS), JFS has always resettled Jews from Russia and Europe to the United States. Under Schillinger's leadership, the agency now resettles refugees from all over the world to Western New York, and is championed as a frontline advocate for the persecuted and unprotected.

Compelled by a Florida colleague's example and Schillinger's personal Elie Wiesel mantra ("All are entitled to live with dignity and respect. / All are entitled to live without fear or pain."), Jewish Family Service opened the Western New York Center for Survivors of Torture (WNYCST) in 2014. The collaborative initiative

provides forensic evaluation through the UB School of Medicine, legal support through Journey's End and care coordination through Jewish Family Service to address a critical gap in necessary care for refugees, asylum-seekers and Holocaust Survivors

In 2016, WNYCST earned recognition from the International Rehabilitation Council for Torture, which has 160 member agencies in over 70 countries. The virtual center has been on hiatus for the past six months, but will receive new, increased funding from the New York State Office of Refugee Resettlement at the end of September "It's a credit to our board and staff that we've been able to keep the center operational during this time for people who have been severely impacted by trauma," says Schillinger.

At the heart of her administrative savvy is an innate ability to bring people together-locally, regionally, nationally and internationally-to meet institutional and individual challenge and change. The partnerships that work, she advises, are those based on mutual trust and the best interest of clients.

"We have strong community ties in the Jewish community and broader Buffalo and Western New York community because the entities we partner with have similar visions and missions," she says. "It's a different environment than 25 years ago, and it's our responsibility to adapt. So that's what we've done."

She credits staff, administration, board members and her religious community, every step of the 25-year way, for enabling her to position IFS to respond effectively and efficiently to changes in the field: "I have never been isolated. I've always had support, on different levels from different groups of people, to help me move through my own challenges and changes," she says. "When you feel supported you are able to give support."

When asked what she wants people to remember most about her time at the helm of Jewish Family Service of Buffalo & Erie County, Schillinger muses. "I've been a strong advocate for people who need and want assistance, for helping people reach their personal goals," she says quietly. "I'm a strong advocate who has fought the good fight, and will continue to always do so. It has been an honor."
