


BY THE NUMBERS: Federation Makes An Impact Part 2

Celebrating our culture, sharing our stories: a look into the history of Jewish Buffalo

This month, Federation is launching an exciting new community resource, one that seeks your participation to be part of history making! The Jewish Buffalo History Center website, powered by the Buffalo Jewish Federation, is an evolving gathering point for community-based history. From synagogues to agencies and organizations, to family and businesses, the website includes a selection of materials from resources generated over the last decade including the illustrated history of Jewish Buffalo released through Arcadia Publishing *(Jewish Community of Greater Buffalo*, 2013) and the image collection available online through *New York Heritage* (https://nyheritage.org/collections/jewish-buffalo-image-collection). These images came out of the work of the Jewish Buffalo Archives Project, supported by the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies. With the launch of Jewish Buffalo History Center website (https://jewishbuffalohistory.org) our goal is to expand upon these materials collaboratively. We hope to provide a place where evolving stories of organizational, commercial, civic and family histories can grow with your help.

Current features of the website include institutional, biographical and thematic sections that explore stories and experiences of Jewish Buffalo from the nineteenth century to more recent times. Touching directly on international, national and local experiences that have animated Jewish life in America over the last two centuries and more, it explores stories of diversity, mobility, connection and community. These themes are especially relevant to the broader Buffalo region which has served as a crossroads and nexus point across much of its histories. As an international port, a manufacturing base, a city of culture, and as an ever-evolving metropolitan region, its vital mix of communities old and new, both ethnically and religiously diverse have made it a place of connection and reinvention.

Being Jewish in the Buffalo region has changed over time too, as Jewish residents have worked to maintain traditions, to fashion new identities and to participate in a variety of Jewish religious streams, or none. Jews in Buffalo have created an array of diverse local institutions and organizations, businesses and initiatives. In communities and social networks within Jewish families and beyond them, in organizations and outside of them, and in ties within non-Jewish communities, Jewish Buffalonians have shaped events, built and maintained communities, faced challenges and catalyzed social and cultural change, producing an array of deep

attachments, past and present, in this place we call home.

This content-rich website highlights these themes as it explores streams of Jewish religious groupings practiced and supported over time. It outlines the histories of agencies, synagogues and voluntary organizations created by Jews in Greater Buffalo, and it pairs these with biographies of Jewish individuals, past and present, who have impacted Buffalo through their creative works, science, arts, culture, volunteerism, leadership and philanthropy. Future plans include online exhibitions and an expansion of the Made in Buffalo series that showcases the contributions of Jews who have "cut their teeth" in Buffalo whether born and raised here, attended school or begun their careers here in Buffalo.

We are very grateful for the many Jewish organizations that have shared their materials with us, particularly when most collections in our local archives have been inaccessible during the pandemic. We also thank the individuals and families that have been willing to share their family histories, and we look forward to highlighting many more. **Please help us grow this website further!**

You are invited to explore the website and immerse yourself in our region's diverse Jewish histories and heritages, and follow links to participate.





Legislator Vinal Secures Funding For The JRT

Hon. Jeanne Vinal, Esq. has lived in the town of Amherst with her family for the past twenty years. Vinal was elected to serve as Erie County Legislator for District 5, which contains about 75 percent of the Town of Amherst and includes Eggertsville, Snyder and the Village of Williamsville. In her first year as Legislator, Vinal secured \$5,000 worth of funding for Jewish Repertory Theatre.

Legislator Vinal said, "It was a priority to get funding for Jewish Repertory Theatre because I know how important community groups such as this one are." The pandemic and shutdowns have strained community groups from both working toward their mission, but also from providing the fellowship, community, support, and fun of being together enjoying a performance. In addition, membership outreach which is always necessary in any group, has also faced setbacks with the pause on large groups meeting in person.

The funds will be used at the discretion of the Theatre's board, and Legislator Vinal plans to attend the next meeting to answer any questions and to speak on the budget and the state of the county. This season, under Saul Elkin's artistic direction, the Jewish Repertory Theatre is presenting Five Staged Virtual Readings. *Find more information, the schedule and tickets at www.jewishrepertorytheatre.com.*



Not in Our County: Defending Dr. Gale Burstein and Mark Poloncarz

Thirteen (13) Buffalo Jewish organizations and synagogues along with the Town of Amherst rapidly signedon to a Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) and Holocaust Resource Center (HRC) opinion article published in *The Buffalo News* this past December defending Commissioner of Health Dr. Gale Burstein and County Exec Mark Poloncarz against antisemitism and hate.

They include: Buffalo Hadassah, Congregation Beth Abraham, Congregation Shir Shalom, Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies, Hillel of Buffalo, Jewish Community Center of Greater Buffalo, Jewish Discovery Center, Jewish Family Services of Western New York, Jewish Federation Cemetery Corporation, Kehillat Ohr Tzion, Open Door Judaism, Temple Beth Tzedek and Temple Beth Zion.

County Executive Mark Poloncarz publicly denounced strong antisemitic and hate attacks toward Commissioner of Health Dr. Gale Burstein and himself in response to COVID-19 safety protocols issued by the county. Dr. Burstein, who is a member of the Jewish community and the recent recipient of the Ann Holland Cohn Community Impact Award, has worked tirelessly and professionally during the pandemic, never focusing on the antisemitic tropes aimed at her.

In addition, the Buffalo Jewish Federation (at the recommendation of the HRC and the JCRC) adopted the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance working definition of antisemitism, which ran last month in *The Jewish Journal*. Over 35 nations, several states, cities and universities have also adopted the definition to use an educational tool. Examples of antisemitism definition are cited in the op-ed below, which was originally signed by the JCRC, HRC, National Federation of Just Communities of WNY, and the Network of Religious Communities.

The following is the text of the op-ed which appeared in "Another Voice" in *The Buffalo News December 16, 2020.*

The job of a county health commissioner is one of the most thankless in all of local government, particularly during a global pandemic. It requires hours and hours of educating the public, sitting in administrative meetings, attending press conferences, and attending the seemingly endless crisis we have faced the past nine months. We are blessed in Erie County to have someone who is at the top of her game, not just in New York State, but also in the entirety of the country. Dr. Gale Burstein has truly gone above and beyond, working round the clock with little in the way of complaint or celebration. Having aggressively tackled the opioid crisis, saving countless lives along the way, she is a seasoned professional who works out of a sense of deep duty to the public who she serves.

What she does not deserve is the endless stream of what Erie County Executive Mark Poloncarz called "very serious, antisemitic attacks" in a Sunday, December 13th Buffalo News article.

Violence against Jews is at a historical level. The Anti-Defamation League reports that American Jewry is experiencing the highest rate of antisemitism since it started collecting data in the 1970s. The language used against our local officials is age-old antisemitism that has led to violence against Jewish communities around the world. We need to stop this rhetoric before it becomes lethal.

Like all antisemitic attacks, the attack on Dr. Burstein consisted of, mendacious, dehumanizing, demonizing, or stereotypical allegations about Jews as such or the power of Jews as collective — such as, especially but not exclusively, the myth about a world Jewish conspiracy or of Jews controlling the media, economy, government or other societal institutions.





During the Holocaust, Nazi Germany systematically murdered six million Jews and five million other peoples (including a member of Mr. Poloncarz's family). If more people had been Upstanders, not bystanders, this atrocity could have been prevented.

Mr. Poloncarz refused to stand by, calling out hate and reminding our community of its democratic values. Again, we join *Mr.* Poloncarz and remind community members, "We must do better. We can do better."

Buffalo Jewish Film Festival Offering Chai Flicks Film and Talkback Series

Following the success of the past year's Virtual Buffalo International Jewish Film Festival, the Festival Committee and JCC of Greater Buffalo are presenting a special **Film and Talkback Series** featuring four movies that were screened and wellreceived at previous festivals. These films are available online through Chai Flicks, the streaming platform launched in August to bring Jewishthemed movies to audiences everywhere. Each of the four films will be followed by a discussion on Zoom.

"Since we received so much positive feedback for our virtual festival in August, Chai Flicks presented a perfect opportunity to offer more films that people can watch and discuss in the comfort of



their homes," said Katie Wzontek, Director of Cultural Arts at the JCC. "Once people have a subscription to Chai Flicks, they can watch our four featured films and more than 150 other selections whenever they wish."

Subscriptions to Chai Flicks (*chaiflicks. com*) cost \$5.99 a month or \$65.99 a year, and can be canceled at any time. In addition to feature films from Israel and around the world, the streaming service offers documentaries, TV series, music, sports and instructional videos, and is being described



as the "Jewish Netflix."

Chai Flicks was created by executives from Menemsha Films, the Californiabased distributor of Jewish-themed entertainment operating since 1998. Previously, Menemsha distributed its films exclusively through Netflix, as well as to Jewish film festivals across North America and Europe. However, when Netflix began to focus on producing its own films, there was need for another outlet for Jewish content, especially once the COVID pandemic closed down theaters. were part of the virtual film festival in August, viewers are able to register for the Zoom discussions through a link that will be provided. Each discussion will be led by a member of the Festival Committee. The regular Buffalo International Jewish Film Festival will once again be virtual this year and run from April 24 through May 15. From Engagement to Investment: A New Model for Jewish Buffalo

More than five years ago, the Buffalo Jewish Federation began to lay the groundwork for a new model of Jewish communal infrastructure, one best suited to an American Jewish community of our size. This effort began by creating a culture of engagement and receptiveness to new perspectives and ideas and took a significant leap forward through the first-ever ENGAGEMENT CONFERENCE and MADE IN BUFFALO featuring Seth Godin. Building upon our learnings, the Federation created opportunities and paths for new leadership through: Task Forces, Community Leadership Gatherings, the Council of Synagogue Presidents, and the leadership councils of the Center for Jewish Engagement and Learning (CJEL) and Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC.) We worked towards a state of collective responsibility and collaboration through the establishment of the Secure Jewish Buffalo Fund and most recently the Community Compassion Fund, consolidation of historic agency infrastructures, and reimagining the Federation's primary mission from a fundraising organization to one focused on building a more robust, caring and connected 21st century Jewish Buffalo.

Our work is far from complete. However today, Jewish Buffalo, now more than ever, operates collaboratively and engages Jewish Buffalo's leadership beyond the walls of respective agencies or synagogues. We are proudly a community where both professionals and volunteers work across institutional lines to address the fundamental questions of individual engagement and building and sustaining Jewish communities, in a coordinated and consultative fashion.

As part of this new communal model, the Federation launched a new lively experiment which builds upon both the idea of collective responsibility and the understanding that exceptional Jewish professionals and synagogue rabbis are crucial partners in our work. As a pilot project for 2021, the Federation is providing grants to three local synagogues to enable their rabbis to embed themselves in specific Federation projects, taking on these part-time roles in addition to their congregational roles and pulpit responsibilities.

In partnership with leadership at Kehillat Ohr Tzion, Congregation Shir Shalom and Temple Beth Tzedek, this novel investment deepens Federation's commitment to communal collaboration, assists in retaining exceptional rabbinical talent here in Buffalo, and helps to offset costs borne by each synagogue. Here is a little more about the three Rabbis who are a part of this pilot project, and the communal projects on which they are focused.



Rabbi Ori Bergman Rabbi of Kehillat Ohr Tzion and Jewish Educator with the CJEL

Rabbi Ori Bergman arrived at Kehillat Ohr Tzion (KOT) in 2017. Prior to finding his passion in serving the Jewish community, Rabbi Bergman began a career as an Immigration Lawver in Toronto, Canada. In addition to his work at KOT, Rabbi Bergman has taught at Kadimah Academy, provided kosher supervision through the Buffalo Vaad HaKashrus (BVK), and taught numerous classes to congregants and the community. Rabbi Bergman and his wife Nora, are parents to four children: Ruvi, Simcha, Devorah Leah, and Zusha. As the earliest participant in the pilot project, Rabbi Bergman has been working part-time as an Educator with the Center for Jewish Engagement and Learning since the summer; his portfolio includes designing and facilitating Jewish learning experiences with teens and young adults through the Buffalo Jewish Teen Initiative and Nickel City Jews.



Rabbi Alex Lazarus-Klein Rabbi of Congregation Shir Shalom and Rabbinic Consultant for the JCRC

Rabbi Alex Lazarus-Klein is a 2004 graduate of the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College. He also holds Masters and Bachelor Degrees from the Jewish Theological Seminary, as well as a Bachelors degree from Columbia University. Before coming to Buffalo in the Fall of 2008, he served as rabbi of Temple B'nai Abraham in Bordentown, New Jersey, and directed the Community Partnership Program for the Jewish Federation of Greater Philadelphia. Rabbi Alex and his wife, Ashirah, are parents to three children: Jarah, Boaz, and Noam. In addition to his congregational work as rabbi of Congregation Shir Shalom, last month Rabbi Alex began as the Rabbinic Consultant for the Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) serving in various roles including building relationships from the JCRC to the greater Buffalo faith community and engaging in programming around issues of racial justice.



Rabbi Adam J. Rosenbaum Rabbi of Temple Beth Tzedek and Jewish Educator with the CJEL

Born in Winnipeg, Canada, Rabbi Rosenbaum grew up in Denver, Colorado and attended Northwestern University before his ordination by the Jewish Theological Seminary in 2005. Upon ordination, Rabbi Rosenbaum served as Temple Beth Shalom's Assistant Rabbi for four years. Rabbi Rosenbaum joins Temple Beth Tzedek (TBT) from Synagogue Emanu-El in Charleston, SC, where he was their spiritual leader for the past 11 years. The Rabbi is the proud father of three children: Shoshana, Jonathan, and Eliana. Beginning last month, Rabbi Rosenbaum has been working part-time as an Educator with the Center for Jewish Engagement and Learning (CJEL), focusing primarily in the Belonging and Adult Engagement space.

This is the beginning of our efforts to reimagine and re-engineer a communal infrastructure for the future. By linking our organizational arms and investing in our community's rabbinic talent, we hope to create a fully integrated community, and in so doing to fully realize the Talmudic creed - *Kol Yisrael Aravim Zeh LaZeh - All of Israel is tied to one another.*

J with her kindness and reference to her Mom and dog.


- J with her unique laughter.

The last letter, "lamed," to the first, "Bet." Put them together? "Lev." Heart, saying to us in our heart of hearts, "We are all the people of Israel, whatever the abilities of our bodies, minds, spirits." And we teach Jewishly.







Howard Wolf Publishes New Novel

Howard R. Wolf, Emeritus Professor and Senior Fellow in the Department of English at University at Buffalo recently announced the collaborative publication of two novellas-Chris Helvey's Behind The Eight Ball and his novel Of Two Lives On The Lower Golanas one volume: Echoes of Loss and Belonging. This innovative publication brings together two authors with vastly different backgrounds whose two novellas reveal deep and shared perceptions about the quest for "belonging." Their protagonists-Earl Turner and Ludwig Fried, the former a Kentucky police officer, the later a displaced Manhattanite living in Israel - both look for a place to belong in communities where they are outsiders; life in Kentucky and Israel echo each other as Earl and Ludwig try to integrate their origins and possible destinations.



The Challenge of Saying Goodbye During the Pandemic

The call came in from the family to visit their relative at a suburban hospital. I knew the congregant well and was devastated to learn she was dying. I was even more devastated to learn it was from COVID. Visiting would be out of the question. The woman, a 98-year-old, died the next day. Her family decided to postpone any memorial until we could gather again in person.

Of all the many indignities of the pandemic, not being able to say goodbye to congregants is one the harshest. As a rabbi, I have been trained to offer comfort to those nearing life's final door. The prayer itself is called the *vidui* or confessional prayer. It involves asking forgiveness from any past wrongs and

offering the words of our central prayer, the *shema*. We pray for the soul to make a safe passage back to God.

The *vidui* is meant to be offered every day of our lives, and is the centerpiece of the Yom Kippur holiday. But, like so many things in life, human beings often wait until the last moment to have the words uttered.

Baring our souls, we beg God, "...May it be Your will that You heal me with total recovery, but, if I die, may my death be an atonement for all my wrongdoings... Master of the Universe may my passing be in peace."

While some may shy away from these moments, I find them beautiful. I am grateful for whatever measure of support I can offer to both the individual and family. I am there both to pray with them and just to witness all they are going through. Watching the body calm into its peaceful final trance is the closest I will get to God before it is actually my turn to exit this world.

For the past ten months I have not even been inside a hospital, let alone offered any final prayers. What once was a routine trip to visit with the many congregants in need, now seems like a perilous journey into the dangerous and unknown. Every week when we receive the hospital census, my heart breaks just a little knowing there is so little I can do to help.

Life and death, though, have continued as normal, now mostly behind the veil of computer and telephone screens. I have conducted conversions on my iPhone, while sitting under the shade of a tree



of a cemetery, blessed wedding couples outside of a retirement center while the couples' grandparents looked on from the windows of the facility, and welcomed babies to the world over a Zoom screen hundreds of miles away from my own. None of these moments were ideal, but I felt fortunate to be present at all, even virtually.

This past week a dear congregant lay dying in the hospital. He was only in his seventies, a vibrant, loving soul, who had navigated years of health challenges. His wife of only a few years was by his side, a blue mask covering the majority of her face. Despite all the two had gone through, she had remained steadfastly by his side.

The staff at our local trauma center had gone above and beyond to contact me and set him up with a Google Duo device in order for us to talk. My congregant's face was frail, with tubes extending out of his throat to help him breath. I barely recognized that it was the same person.

He nodded his head and mouthed words to communicate and I tried my best to express what was in my heart, and he to share what was in his.

I told him that I loved him and appreciated all he done for me over the years. I voiced the words of the Deuteronomy: *Hear O Israel the Lord Our God, the Lord is One*, and asked forgiveness for anything that had been left undone.

The moment was so preciously painful. I could not even begin to imagine what his spouse and family were going through. Afterwards, one of the nurses, who happened to be a congregant, texted to let me know how peaceful the man had gotten after our conversation. A few hours later he was gone.

As I stood at the cemetery a few days later with the meager crowd of ten we were permitted (all masked, of course), tears welled up in my eyes, not just for this congregant, but for all the moments stolen from us by this insidious virus, for the lesser world into which we would eventually return, and for the overwhelming grief of not being able to properly say goodbye.

Composed as a memorial to his countryman, Arensky's lyrical work reinvents a theme from Tchaikovsky's "16 Songs for Children," while fellow compatriot Shostakovich prophesied his chamber piece, colored by the WWII destruction of Dresden, would be his requiem. The program concludes with the yearning of

Haydn's dissonant and dramatic Symphony No. 44.
